Lloyd George and MacDonald on Threatened Railway Strike.

LONDON, To-day. How tenaciously the Government is clinging to the hopes of a settlement of the railway dispute and the effecting of a working arrangement was displayed by Lloyd George in a speech in the House of Commons last night. The attitude of the Government set abroad the impression that the situation had taken a strong turn for the better and that fears of an immediate strike might vanish. MacDonald the labor leader in the House, had prepared to move a vote of censure against the Government for its use of the military in strikes, and because of its general attitude in the present situation. The feeling in the House ran high. Lloyd George intimated that representatives of the unions had failed to understand the Government's offer to form a Royal Commission, which would report what amendments were necessary to the 1907 agreement between the railway management and the men. It was not proposed to form an ordinary commission, but one composed of three members, one representing the railways, one the men, with a chairman who was well known for his impartiality and who enjoyed the general confidence of the community. Although there had been no withdrawal of the ultimatum by the men, the Chancellor declared that the House would be pleased to know that negotiations for a settlement of the trouble had not been broken off. "I have not given up hope of arriving at some solution of the difficulty, satisfactory to all parties," said Lloyd George. MacDonald said there had been a misunderstanding of the Government's proposal, and he would not press the

Banker in Port.

LONDON, To-day. The banker Edward Roy, Capt. Charles, arrived last night from the Banks. She is now at Bishop & Sons wharf getting a new mainmast. The schooner was outfitted by Bishop of Burlington. Wednesday last while leaving the Banks for the Labrador a squall of wind broke off the mainmast about 4 feet below the hounds. Everything came down by the board and there was an awful litter on the deck. The broken spar was fitted with a jury mast. After a good deal of trouble the mainmast, double reefed, to suit the spar was got on her and she made fine way to St. John's. Capt. Charles has a crew of 18 men and will spend a few weeks fishing on the Labrador Banks off Dominio.
