Warships Soon of 30,000 Tons.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 7.—As soon as some other nation begins to arm its warships with 14-inch guns—the calibre of the rifles which will compose the main battery of the latest designed dreadnoughts of the American navy—the United States will be believed...

The problem of a 16-inch gun is already being worked out in theory to resist the terrific recoil. These plans, connected with imaginary 25,000 and 40,000 ton battleships in order to be prepared to take an advance step whenever foreign competition warrants it.

With the size and strength of warships growing from year to year in this world-wide race to excel, naval experts are beginning to wonder when and where the climax will be reached. The rapid development in size is demonstrated by the dreadnoughts built or building for the United States navy. The Utah, which has just been placed under commission, has a displacement of 21,825 tons; the Arkansas and Wyoming, which will be completed in less than a year, will be 26,000 tons, with the Texas and New York, whose construction was begun only a few months ago, will be 27,000 tons. With the 26,000 and 27,000-ton ships building the Navy Department is planning to make the displacement of the two battleships authorized by the last naval act 28,500 tons. That is certainly not the end, for it is believed that the next dreadnoughts will be at least 30,000 tons.

Seaweed.

The day may not be far distant when suits made from seaweed will be as common as that from wool or cotton.

Seaweed is really a most useful commodity. It forms a cheap barometer and holiday memento for the children; it provides the farmer with a somewhat odiferous manure; certain varieties of the weed have been turned to account in the manufacture of photographic materials, and now it promises to supply us with summer garments.

The weed used for this purpose comes from Australia and is more a fibre than a seaweed proper. It is dredged up from the bottom of the sea.

During the past few months several mills in Yorkshire have been experimenting, in the hope that cloth could be made from it. At first it was thought too coarse for the manufacture of suitings, but the results are said to have been very satisfactory and beyond all expectation.

It is light brown in color, as soft as wool and will readily take wool dyes.

Sun Shine on Lenses

Started Blaze Which Burned House Down.




