Hon. John Harvey and
Sir Wm. MacGregor.

In the Evening Chronicle's report of what the Hon. John Harvey said in moving the second reading of "A Bill to Prevent Premises from Spitting," and which was published last evening, the following occurs, namely:—
"He then explained very fully and clearly the attitude of Sir William MacGregor towards sanatoriums as a good deal of misapprehension had been created regarding that gentleman's position. He said that at a public meeting in the British Hall on February 29, 1908, Sir William MacGregor in his speech advocated sanatoriums as one of the means in a general policy for the conservation of the public health, but that a year later when addressing a meeting of the A. P. C. which had been formed meantime, Sir William advised that Association not to have anything to do with a sanatorium because it was beyond their means."
"We do not think that the slightest misapprehension exists as to Sir William MacGregor's position in respect to the Establishment of Sanatoriums in the country for Sir Robert Bond put the position so clearly that the wavering man, though a fool, could not err therein." Sir Robert said that in the year 1908 at a public meeting held in the British Hall Sir William MacGregor advocated Sanatoriums and that twelve months later at the "Second Public Meeting" held in the British Hall, on June 1st, Sir William MacGregor had said, in addressing that public meeting "I warn you against the idea of Sanatoriums. They are beyond O.T.R. means." The Hon. John Harvey is in error in stating that "Sir William MacGregor" advised the Association "only or that his remarks only applied to the means of the disposal of the Association. Sir William did not say their (the Association's) means, but our means, that is to say the public means, for he was speaking at a "Public Meeting" and not at a "Private Meeting" as stated by His Lordship Bishop Jones. The wording of the whole paragraph in which the above occurs clearly indicates that the interpretation placed upon them by Sir Robert Bond was the correct interpretation, and if any person questions this we refer them to a pamphlet containing the full report of Sir William MacGregor's speech entitled, "Second Annual Public Meeting Report of the Association for Prevention of Consumption," published by Barnes & Co. in 1909.

Lecture to S. U. F.
Last night in the British Hall Rev. H. Phillips, Rector of St. Mary's Church, returned before a large number of members of the S. U. F. The subject was "Studies in human nature" and the rev. gentleman handled it in a most clear and entertaining manner. He recounted in a most interesting way experiences of his own in some of the London dioceses in which he laboured, especially amongst the dwellers in the slums and many pathetic as well as humorous incidents were narrated. The lecture was thoroughly enjoyed, and at its close Grand Secretary J. C. Phillips proposed a vote of thanks, which was seconded by Mr. T. Levesque and carried by acclamation. Mr. Phillips thanked the audience for the cordial reception and attentive hearing given him. Grand Purser W. H. Goodland presided. After the lecture the monthly meeting of the Lodge was held when two candidates were initiated and five others admitted for membership. A deal of important business was transacted.

Methodist Temperance Rally.

A great temperance rally under the auspices of the Methodist denomination will be held in the Methodist College Hall, on Tuesday night next, March 12th, at 8 o'clock. The meeting has been fixed so as to give all the workers who will be then in the city an opportunity of being present and the President of the Conference, Rev. A. A. Holmes, will likely preside. Rev. C. Hackett who was present at the Temperance and Moral Reform Committee Meeting at Toronto last fall, will present a report. Rev. Dr. Rogers and Hon. J. A. Robinson will present a series of Resolutions relating to temperance and it is expected that the meeting will give a marked impetus to the temperance movement in Newfoundland.

The Nfld. Poultry Association held their regular monthly meeting last evening. There was a large attendance and eighteen new members joined. After the most important business was discussed, samples of various kinds of poultry feed, etc., were shown, and in which much interest was displayed by the members. The Association has in view at present a scheme for encouraging people (not members) to produce better poultry.
