BIG MATINEE TO-MORROW AFTERNOON.

At the House

Mr. Kent presented a petition for a well at Pouch Cove; Mr. Downey asked for a bonus for clearing land for people of Highlands and Crabbees and Mr. Morris petitioned for telephone extension at St. Joseph's.

The Bill to amend the Consolidated Statutes respecting the storage and carrying of gunpowder and other explosives passed with some amendments.

The House then went into Committee on the Bill for the Protection and growth of partridge berries. The Bill provided for a date to be fixed in the Autumn season between September 1st to 15th, for the picking of berries. The Premier complimented the hon. member for Bay de Verde in bringing the matter before the House, and a statistical form stated the amount and value of berries exported from the Colony the past decade, showing \$23,545 barrels, valued at \$1 per barrel or \$23,545. He then referred to the Cape Cod Cranberry Industry, and fully dealt with by Mr. Hickman some little time ago.

Mr. Jennings was glad to see the measure before the House, and hoped it would become law. He pointed out that the ripening of berries fluctuates early on a dry season and late on a wet season, but if a fixed date was going to be made the 10th of September would suit the District of Twillingate.

Mr. Hickman thought that the matter of fixing a date to begin picking berries should be left in the hands of the Minister of Agriculture. He suggested that the Government experiment and find out if the berries could be cultivated and expressed the opinion that the partridge berry industry

could be a profitable and valuable one to our people and to the country if properly carried on.

Mr. Kent in supporting the measure said that the protection of our partridge berries was very desirable and that the thanks of the whole community was due to Mr. Hickman for his attention he gave to the matter and for bringing in the Bill. The industry may look small at the outset, but if properly carried out as outlined by Mr. Hickman, it will be the foundation of a great industry. It occurred with the hon. member for Bay de Verde that from Sept. 1st to the 15th would be the proper time to fix, and incidentally expressed the hope that a new Minister of Agriculture will be appointed before the time comes round.

Messrs. Clapp, Targett, Coaker and Leveaux also spoke in support of the Bill. The Bill passed the Committee, to be read a third time on Monday. The House then went into Committee on the Sealing Bill. Mr. Coaker, the introducer of the Bill, dealt exhaustively with the seal industry from its early history down to the present time, quoted figures showing the number of the different kind of seals brought in, but the Prime Minister would deal with the protection of seals in his resolution, he was satisfied to cut Section 7 from the Bill. He believed that the section dealing with the landing of a portion of the crew could be easily worked out. Messrs. Moulton, Jennings, Higgins, Kent, Emerson, Downey and Vinsor in turn, spoke in support of the Bill. The Committee rose at 6.30 to sit again on Monday.
