Sealer Erik Back From the Gulf.

Reports Diana Practically Clean.

The S.S. Erik, Capt. D. Martin, arrived from the Gulf sealfishery at 7 o'clock this morning, hailing for 200 seals, mostly old ones. Shortly after leaving here on March 8th, the ship struck the land near Bay Bulls Head, being carried in there by the ice. Twelve men, who were on deck, jumped ashore and came back to St. John's. The ship was only slightly damaged and proceeded to Channel, which was left on March 12th. Going up the Gulf very heavy ice was met and the ship got jammed and made very little headway for the entire season. Only a few scattered seals were sighted each day and these were secured by the crew. Late in the spring some of the crew became uneasy and wanted to come home. They listened to Capt. Martin, however, and went hunting old ones but without success.

On Friday last the voyage was abandoned, it being thought useless to remain out any longer. That day the Diana was spoken to and she reported for 90 pelts. The Erik called at Codroy on the way home and landed a portion of her crew. The Diana is also on her way home.

Fox Cases Dismissed.

Before Judge Knight yesterday afternoon the fox cases, in which Constable Cramm, of Lewisporte, had (1) Mr. D. F. Piercey summoned for purchasing two foxes in close season, 1913; and (2) Mr. H. D. Reid for having in his possession two foxes in close season, were heard. Messrs. Samuel Russell and Timothy Pilley, who were tried before Magistrate Bradley, at Lewisporte, last spring, pleaded guilty and were fined \$250 each, were the first witnesses examined. They testified that they did sell these foxes to Piercey in October, 1913, and received for them \$2,400 or \$1,200 each. On being sworn Piercey admitted buying two silver foxes from the witnesses and corroborated that he paid them \$2,400 and took a receipt for the money paid. He stated that he was assured by the sellers that the foxes were caught in open season. In support of this he said that when the foxes were delivered to him at Notre Dame Junction that they were in excellent condition and as far as he could judge (and he was an expert regarding foxes) did not show any evidence of being in confinement for any length of time; also that the amount paid was commensurate with the market prices. The Judge held that the complainants had not been able to prove that Piercey knew that the foxes were captured in close season and that there was no case against Piercey on the ground that he paid a very high price for the foxes and that the sale took place in the open season.

Reid's case depended on Piercey's case, it being alleged that Piercey was Reid's Agent. The case against Reid was withdrawn and Mr. W. R. Howley, who acted for the defendants, stated that upon his honour as a counsel, Piercey was engaged buying foxes for a corporation of which Mr. Reid was only a shareholder and that Mr. Reid had no other interest in the transaction.

Mr. C. E. Hunt and I. G. Sullivan conducted the cases for the prosecution.

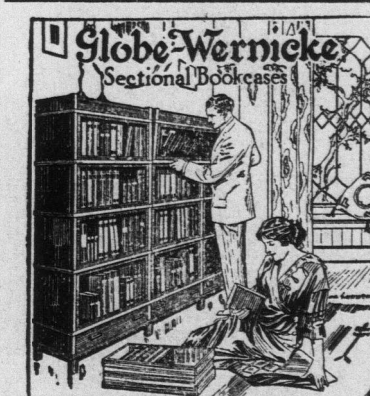
