Smuggling.

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir,—I saw a note in your paper not long ago from "President of Parker's Cove," denying that the person referred to in an item in the St. John's papers of May 25th, entitled "Smuggler Caught," was a resident of that place.

Smuggling and other breaches of the Customs laws takes place in other parts of the country besides Placentia Bay, and the public hears very little about them if the offenders are punished at all. Nearly every week the past Spring could be seen in the St. John's papers an account of some smuggler caught in and about Placentia Bay, giving the man's name, the goods seized, the fines paid and so on.

Now that is all right the public generally know that there has been more smuggling than usual (of late years) carried on around the districts of Placentia and Barren this Spring, and the Customs officials are to be commended for the manner in which they have discovered and dealt with the various cases.

When we attempt to smuggle from St. Pierre or elsewhere, we do so with our eyes open, we know the risk we run and if we are caught in the attempt, we pay the fine imposed, suffer the confiscation of our goods and any other penalties that may be imposed upon us.

Remember, Mr. Editor, that what we mean by smuggling is the successful importation without the knowledge of the Customs authorities, goods liable to the payment of duty, but when it comes to more serious breaches of the law we draw the line, yet we are often held up to the public gaze as offenders of the worst kind. Now, if the rumours that from time to time reach here of the condition of things in Customs circles on the West Coast be true, I think that Inspector O'Reilly could be sent in that direction.

Fishery Report.

The following reports of the fishery are now posted at the Board of Trade Rooms:

July 31st.—From W. White, (Port Rexton).—The catch to date 3,900 quintals, with 120 for last week. Thirty-seven traps and 45 boats are fishing. Prospects are poor and the supply of caplin bait is limited. Two of the traps had about 12 qtls. each for the week and many others half qtl. daily. Several have been taken in for repairs.

July 31st.—From R. Brown, (Upper Amherst Cove to Bay L'Argent).—Prospects could not be worse for hook and liners, and caplin bait is getting scarce, but there is a sign of squid. The catch is now 7,000 qtls., and for last week 2,000. Eighty traps and 400 dories and skiffs are fishing. The lobster fishery is very poor. On the first four days of the week the traps did fairly well, but not so well the last two days.

July 31st.—From S. E. Chafe, (South Head of Briggs to Day Roberts Point).—Prospects are not very bright, especially for hook and liners and bait is scarce. The hook and liners are doing very little, and the trapping season is almost over. The best three catches at Port de Grave are: 350, 250 and 200 qtls., while the best trap at Briggs has about 230. Twenty traps and 60 punts are fishing. The total catch is 1,300 qtls., with 500 for last week.
