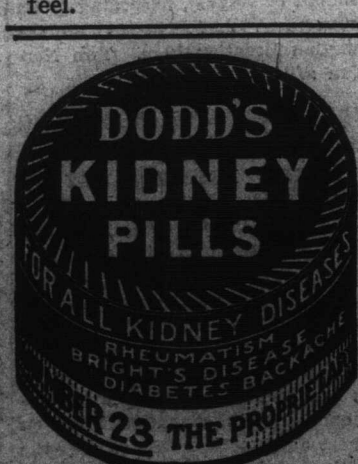

**Motor Association Meeting.**

Last evening's meeting of the Motor Association, Mr. F. W. Ayre presiding, was well attended, some fifty members being present. Following the reading of the minutes of last meeting by Secretary Collishaw, and their adoption, the additional bye-laws or rules of the road, governing the driving of cars, signals to be used, etc., were read and adopted. These will apply to cyclists as well as drivers of cars. Mr. W. R. Warren announced that the Association had been finally registered and explained the delay in having same done. On motion of Mr. A. W. Piccott, seconded by Mr. Wm. White, it was decided that the officers and executive that had been previously elected pro tem, retain office until the annual general meeting in May next. These are: President, F. W. Ayre; 1st V.P., W. S. Monroe; 2nd V.P., W. A. O'D. Kelly; Secretary, R. Collishaw; Executive, Messrs. W. R. Warren, J. Sellars, J. O. Havermale, Dr. McLaughlin and Dr. Scully. The Secretary announced that 80 members had forwarded their fees to date, and in addition, the following subscriptions had been received: F. J. Canine, \$25; Harold Bishop, \$15; J. J. Lacey, \$10; J. A. McKenzie, \$10; Another \$100; W. S. Monroe, \$100; E. Collishaw, \$100; J. Sellars, \$100; A. W. Piccott, \$10; Dr. Cowperthwaite, \$10. Letters from forty car owners, expressing their intention of joining the Association, have been received. Twenty-one of those present volunteered their services in bringing in additional members. The executive of nine, mentioned above, will meet at once to name the committees on roads, discipline, etc. It appears that a large sum, to be expended in improving the condition of different highways, will be forthcoming, as including fees and subscriptions, there is already about \$1,500 on hand, and it is expected this sum will be doubled. It was also decided that every member display a badge, in the form of a wheel enclosing a red star, on his wind shield. These badges, for the present, will be of the transfer type, and the secretary will see to the securing of metal ones as early as possible. The meeting adjourned at 10.15.

Fire Last Night.

Shortly before 12 o'clock last night, an alarm of fire from Box 32, called the Central and West End Companies to Barter's Hill, where the garage of Hector Chafe was afire. It was started by one of a couple of boys, who were measuring gasoline, touching the liquid with a lighted candle, which he held in his hand. The firemen soon had the fire under control, but not before considerable damage was done to the building, and a car that was stored there for repairs. The all-out signal sounded 20 minutes after the alarm.

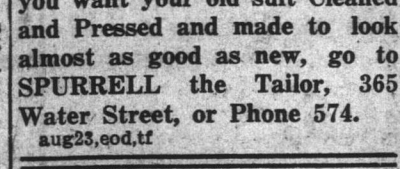

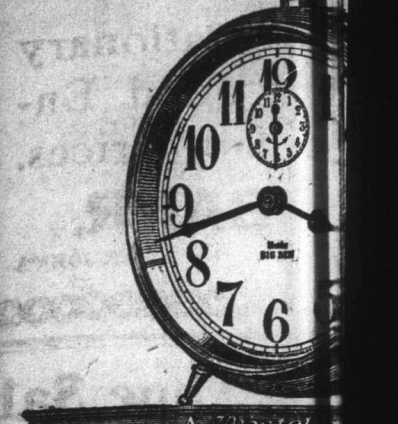

of the Marne.**

ere is not a sod in the whole length of the "Catalanians," where the Boche is now beaten, which has not been a sepulchre since the beginning of historic time. Long before I watched a peasant ploughing there, making a tall, shivering, shivering post, and saw a white object appear in the wave of earth turning over. It was "his tooth." A tooth, it seems, arrives all the other bones of a man, and it is just possible this grim relic had actually there undisturbed ever since the year in which the first battle of the Marne freed the red, kindly, winged West from the nameless horrors of a Mon-
