Selected An Interesting Messenger.

(From the New York Times.) As curious as any incident in th whole war was the action of the Turkish Government in choosing Gen eral Townshend, who had been its prisoner ever since the fall of Kutel-Amara, to carry its offer of surrender and plea for mercy to the British Admiral commanding in the Aegean Sea. Captives have been sen before, of course, to carry message to the forces to which they had themselves belonged, but there does not ome to mind any previous instance in which an officer of this rank was thus used. Realizing that their situation was desperate, the Turks may have seen the possibility of deriving some advantage from a kindly and generous act sure to create some thing of much-needed goodwill in the minds of both the British General and his friends at home. They may have felt, again, the desirability of beginning negotiations through a messenger whose trustworthiness

could not be questioned by those to whom he was sent. His appearance in such a role certainly proved that he was himself convinced of Turkey's sincere desire to quit of her once terrible ally and to get out of the war on the best terms the victorious enemy would grant. General Townshend, naturally, would not have accepted the mission if he had not believed in that sincerity, for it is to be presumed that his captivity was not intolerably severe. That he was as

well treated as circumstances permitted is more than probable, not because the Turks are incapable of abusing prisoners, but because they are quite intelligent enough to understand how profitable it would be for them to use this particular prisoner courteously as well as mercifully. General Townshend must have been glad indeed thus to regain his freedom. His errand was honorable and complimentary. As everybody long since knew, the failure of his expedition was in no respect his fault, and he will not have to defend at home, as defeated Generals usually


