Inspector General Hutchings is in receipt of the following further particulars of the awful accident at Heart's Content, on Wednesday last: "At about 10.30 p.m. on the 23rd Mr. Z. Baker saw fire issuing from the house occupied by Mr. Smith and family, situated about 150 yards distant. Mr. Baker and wife hastened to the scene and were met at the kitchen door by Mrs. Smith who handed them two small children, and then re-entered the house for the third child. This was the last seen of her or the child, and although every effort was made to effect an entrance to try and rescue the mother and her little one, the flames had by this time become so fierce that Baker found it impossible. The two children saved were aged one year and two years, while the mother aged 25 and the other child aged 5 years were burnt to death. Mr. Smith, who is an employee of the Reid Nfld. Co., had only left home that day."

Legislative Council.

Council met at 4 o'clock yesterday.

Excellency the Governor, accompanied by Lieut. Edens, A.D.C., in the Chamber shortly after when Mr. Speaker and members of the House of Assembly had commenced to the bar, gave his assent to the Bill to further extend the term of Parliament.

Third reading of the Bill re-elections in the present year, the committee stage of the Commission of Workmen's Bill were discussed.

Mr. Anderson explained at the motive of "The Ejection of the Bill." The object of the Bill is to prevent ejection of tenants by an Act of law, providing the tenant complied with his contract; and of being back in rent, he had right to tender the amount due.

It would also be unlawful to increase rent during the period the Act was in force, though the landlord would be right to demand a proper amount for repairs made. The Bill should remain in force until May, when the tenant would be required to pay up to \$300.00 a year.

After having the houses sold their heads, or the rents increased, Mr. Squires thought the past of an Act of such scope would in great hardship. He cited a case of a soldier, who with his wife, paying \$48.00 a month board, and an earning capacity of \$80.00.

After he had purchased a home the Bill became law, it would be a terrible loss to the soldier, as another case in which a man owned a two-flat house, one of the flats out. Recently his son, a returned with a wife, and the son was now trying to obtain this for his son. With the proposed in force, the son would have to leave the country. He said the bill as it stood at present, going too far.

Mr. McEwen thought that a Commission of 5 or 6 members should be appointed to deal with the matter, and the Bill needed to be modified.

Mr. McEwen also referred to the bill as being too far fetched.

Mr. Anderson asked that the bill be deferred until the next session.

Several bills sent them from the House of Assembly were read a first time and ordered to be read a second time at 5 o'clock adjournment was taken at 4 o'clock Monday afternoon.
