Bolshevism—a Disease.

(By SERGT. GUY EMPY.)

The following extracts from "Treat 'em Rough," published in New York, by Sergt. Guy Empey, makes interesting reading, as showing an ex-service man's opinion and advice on the problem of Bolshevism in the States.

From New York's east side came the leaders of the unspeakable Bolshevik reign of terror in Russia. Like a malignant cancer it has ravaged and emaciated one of the greatest powers. The Reds count Russia as their first victim. Next in order they plan to conquer Germany, then the United States. Those breeders of anarchy who did not go to Europe are here now among us, engaged actively in seditious agitation.

Are we to allow this horde of blood-mad maniacs, who respect neither God nor human life nor the honor of women, to reproduce in America the unutterable atrocities which to-day make Russia worse than a living hell?

Boys, we have just finished a big job, but a greater one looms up. An enemy has developed in our midst. It is Bolshevism. The Russians define it as "the rule of the proletariat." We Americans have the right name for it—Anarchy.

It cannot be fought with the bayonet alone, because the bayonet is a man's weapon. Bolshevism is a disease, a poison, insidious propaganda. To fight it successfully your rear must be protected, because Bolshevism uses the dagger of the assassin, stabbing in the back. We cannot "fall in," in company formation and advance upon this enemy with bayonets fixed. If we could it would be a comparatively easy and simple matter. It must be a fight of the individual. There can be no generals or captains in this campaign. Every one must be a private. You must fight it with your own mind; the "buck" cannot be passed to the other fellow. If you leave it to him to do the work it means that you have become a Bolshevist. Live up to the ideals of Americanism and Bolshevism will be defeated. If a person, in your presence, should insult the American flag, what would you do? No doubt for the benefit of the community, you would help dig his grave.

Bolshevism is trying to substitute the red flag for the American flag. It is our duty to keep our colors clean. Think of the thousands of our bunks who died in France for that flag. Is it not due them that the Bolshevist parasites be shaken from the folds of the Star-Spangled Banner?

Ninety Per Cent. Foreigners.

Ninety per cent. of the Bolshevists in America are foreigners. The other ten per cent. are native traitors to the United States and its ideals. Taken as a whole they are the scum of the earth.

To a certain extent it is our fault that these trouble-makers are in our midst. Our immigration laws were too lenient. We threw our gates

the guise of friendship, sows seeds of discontent in your heart. He asks you why your troubles should exist and tells you that you are being unjustly treated by your Government, that capital is persecuting you—that if the masses took the law in their own hands every man would have an equal share of the blessings of the land.

If you are up against it financially, ask him to lend you some money; test out his sympathy—see if it is real. If you are looking for work ask him if he can give you a job, or direct you where you can secure employment. You will find by his evasive answers that he is not there to help you; that he is simply trying to make you more discontented and unhappy. Then, back him into a corner (there is no danger in this—he won't fight—none of them will), take him by the throat with your left hand, haul back that good Yankee fist of yours and preach to him True Americanism. He will squeal like a pig. But don't listen to his squealing, just let him have it between the eyes.

Do not confuse the Industrial Workers of the World with organized labor. Did you ever see an "I.W.W." who worked with anything but his mouth and an occasional bomb? The "I.W.W." are the chief exponents of Bolshevism.

Do not forget that while you are fighting "Over There" or training "Over Here" at thirty dollars per month, these Bolshevists were fighting you and were trying to undermine your Government in order to impede the prosecution of the war.

There are thousands of pro-Germans in the United States. Since the Armistice was signed we have more or less forgotten them; but remember, their hearts are still the same—they hate the United States and will do everything in their power to injure this country. They have joined the ranks of the Bolshevists—it is their opportunity.

Printed on War Maps.

No less singular are whole series of Polish stamps, because they have changed their nationality twice. When the Germans invaded Poland they seized the Polish stamps and Teutonized them by printing an inscription on their face. After the armistice the tables were turned. Then authority reverted to the Poles, who, by oblitterating the German surcharge, brought the stamps back into practically their original position.

But at least one series of Polish stamps will perhaps have even greater historical value. Produced at a time when paper was precious, it is printed on the back of German war maps, and, from a philatelic point of view, is a great curiosity.
