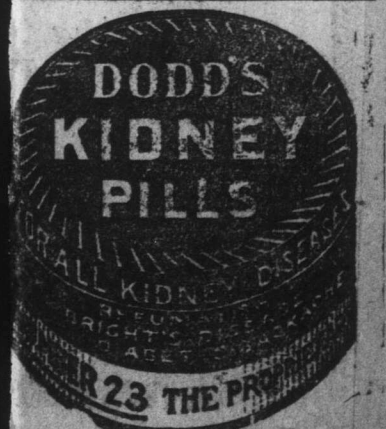

CHEERED LLOYD GEORGE.

LONDON, Oct. 5. (Reuter's Ottawa Agency).—Premier Lloyd George left Downing Street at 5.26 p.m. and motored to Buckingham Palace. The large crowd in Whitehall loudly cheered him, which he smilingly acknowledged. The special Trades Union conference arranged for Tuesday, October 7, has been abandoned in consequence of the settlement.

SETTLEMENT TERMS ACCEPTED.

LONDON, Oct. 5.

(Reuter's Ottawa Agency).—At a great and enthusiastic meeting of the railway men in Albert Hall to-night, Secretary V. H. Thomas said that the railway men had come out solid, and remained solid. He wished them to resume work equally solidly. None of them wanted to claim a great victory, because they could only win a victory over an enemy. They regarded the result reached as an honorable settlement, with which everybody must be pleased. In working out the settlement, Mr. Thomas said, Lloyd George played a great part. The meeting adopted a resolution accepting the terms of settlement and undertaking to abide by them loyally.

STRIKE A FAILURE.

LONDON, Oct. 5.

(Reuter's Ottawa Agency).—It is too soon to sum up all the reasons for the strike, but it was an attempt to hold the Government. It has been a great failure. The railwaymen have been out eight days, and have spent £200,000 in strike pay, without result. They have never succeeded at any time in imperiling the life of the nation, for which these two factors are chiefly responsible, namely the admirable organization of an emergency service by the Government, and the courageous and cheerful acquiescence of the whole public in the temporary inconvenience. From the first sudden stoppage of work, food supplies were absolutely assured, arrangements having been made to distribute milk and other perishable commodities in the larger towns. The mails were but slightly retarded, newspapers were delivered as usual, and necessary journeys throughout the country performed by motor transport and limited service trains, driven largely by amateurs. The attitude of the whole people has been beyond praise. There was no question whatever of a universal determination to make the best of discomforts, to preserve order and form a strong civic guard. With that object in view, and above all, to refuse to allow the community to be held ransom by any one section, for the preservation of order, high tribute must be paid to the trade unions, including the railwaymen who did their utmost to discourage sabotage. It is a remarkable fact that throughout the past week not a rifle shot was fired. There was not a single instance of death or serious injury, and there was no looting anywhere. The situation has been serious enough but it assuredly offers no encouragement to those who imagined England to be a fertile field for revolution.

Dried Fish.

Late advices from Lunenburg indicate an unusually heavy catch, with the Gaspe coast catch running about normal. Norway, so far, has not been a factor in Western markets. With numerous Lunenburg fishing vessels still to be heard from, it is estimated that the summer catch alone will exceed 200,000 quintals, and that the total for 1919—including the spring trips—will run well over 300,000 qts. as compared with 238,000 quintals in 1918 and 233,000 quintals in 1917. While early spring trips sold at \$14 per quintal, the regular spring trips brought \$12, and it is not believed likely that present landings will sell at a higher figure than \$10, as predicted in a recent issue of The Fishing Gazette. According to our contemporary, "The Maritime Merchant," (Halifax, N.S.) the price of present landings will average about \$9, "if marketed soft cured, as has been the method of fishermen during the past few years of keen buying competition." Up to the present writing, weather conditions—said to be the worst in many years—have not improved, and the fishermen are speculating as to whether they will be able to get the whole catch cured before the arrival of frost. The fish dryer's position is further complicated by the scarcity of labor, despite the fact that wages have increased by leaps and bounds. Transportation conditions are most acute, and the adverse exchange is likewise contributing to the general perplexity of the situation.—N. Y. Fishing Gazette, Sept. 27.
