Methodist Conference.

Friday, June 25. The Conference met at 9.30 a.m. A hymn was sung and Rev. S. H. Williams led in prayer. The Journal of the previous session was read and adopted. After the correspondence was read, the Report of the Sustaining Fund Committee was presented by the Secretary, Rev. W. H. Branning. The current claims were met in full and a balance of \$122 carried over to next year. An exceedingly interesting discussion took place before the Report was finally adopted. Rev. Dr. Burns, representing the Finance Department, was then called upon to speak, and outlined the work of his department of which Rev. S. W. Dean is the efficient chief. Under the supervision of his department come the following interests: The General Conference Fund, the increase in ministers' salaries, the Parsonage Aid Fund, Church Property and Insurance, and Stewardship. The Doctor, in a very clear and definite way dealt with each matter in turn. Speaking of the Insurance of Church Property, he said, that already two million dollars' worth was effected, and he urged the wisdom of insuring all church property. Dr. Burns answered various questions covering the work of his Department very satisfactorily.

Rev. J. D. Simpson presented the report of the Methodist Book Room, Toronto, for Rev. T. Fallis, the Book Steward. The "Guardian" has a circulation of 32,126, a gain of 10,298 over the previous year. In Newfoundland there were 181 subscribers, an increase of 38.

In 1919 the cost of publishing the "Guardian" was \$42,000; in 1920, \$34,000. The S. S. Publications Dept. showed a net profit for 1919 of \$23,198. The total profits of last year were \$108,000. The Superannuation Fund receives \$30,000. The value of the New Wesley buildings is \$1,042,000 with a revenue of \$63,000. The Report was readily adopted.

At midday the Rev. Dr. Pedley began his address, after prayer by W. J. Scott, Esq., subject: "Some Paradoxes of a Minister's Life." He emphasized the need for a good understanding between ministers and laymen in facing the problems of the church. A paradox was the uniting of qualities that seem opposed to each other. In 2 Cor. 6: 3-10 was one of the most classical paradoxes known. The paradoxes of a minister's life were three in number. (1) Solitary yet Social. It is possible to combine the secular and social, to blend the two. In the minister there is a craving for solitude. Jesus advised being alone, "And when thou

After the Report of the Missionary Committee, the Conference adjourned to give the various committees an opportunity to meet. At 6.15 the members of the Conference and their wives met by invitation in the schoolroom of the church to enjoy a banquet prepared by the ladies of Wesley congregation. The repast was excellent and splendidly served. The decorated tables were filled with choice and dainty goods, and all did full justice to a very fine repast. Addresses were given by Rev. Mr. Bugden, the Pastor, Rev. Dr. Fenwick, Rev. Dr. Saint, Mr. Albert Soper, Mrs. Eugene Lindsay, Rev. Dr. Pedley, Rev. J. D. Simpson, Rev. Prof. Watson, all in a humorous vein and expressive of appreciation of the fine hospitality of the ladies of Wesley Church. The formal resolution of thanks was carried by a standing vote.

The evening session opened, with hymn and prayer by Rev. A. Holmes. The minutes were read and confirmed after which the Meth. National Campaign Report was read by Mr. H. N. Burt. The Report showed 2,480 Intercessors, 1,043 P. Workers, 748 Church members, 589 young people, 16 for life service and a financial result of \$40,517. The spiritual objectives have yet to be realized in full. The recommendations of the committee were accepted by Conference. Dr. Burns next spoke of the M.N.C. The final financial report gave \$4,800,715 for the campaign; Toronto alone raised \$1,100,000; Montreal realized 133 p.c. of its objective and Nova Scotia 128 p.c. The things growing out of the campaign were to be valuable in the extension of the Kingdom. The united movement of the church: the co-operative strategy for the Kingdom: unity of aim: unity of organization. The consecrated response of all classes involving a great sacrifice was magnificent indeed.

Rev. J. D. Simpson, Secretary Superannuation Department next spoke on the work of his department and said his task was to sustain the morale of the church army. In a clear, convincing and moving address he set forth the claims of the veterans of the Cross. The Fund had grown to \$361,842 in 1919. The ministers and probationers had paid \$81,972 of this. Four hundred veterans, four hundred widows and one hundred children were dependent upon this fund. The capital of the fund is \$917,146 exclusive of the M.N.C. The address was masterly and elicited a very warm response from the audience. Rev. Dr. Curtis, Rev. Dr. Bond, Mr. Albert Soper and Mr. Geo. Gushie spoke in appreciation of the address.

The weekly meeting of the Municipal Council was held Thursday night last. Mayor Gosling and Councillors Ayre, Mullaly and Morris were present.

The minutes being confirmed the following business was disposed of: Capt. Leo Murphy, on behalf of the Memorial Committee of the G.W.V.A., asked permission to erect shrine at Bannerman Park in connection with the Memorial Services, which will be held on July 1st. The request was acceded to.

The Secretary Military Hospitals Commission requested a four inch water main installed at the Military Hospital, Water St. West. Request will be granted, provided they pay costs to install same.

J. W. Nichols applied for service pipe to his residence, near Burton's Pond. Engineer will inquire into this. J. Ivany applied for position of driver of motor sprinkler. No appointment has as yet been made. His application was ordered filed.

Wm. Snow, Leslie Street, asked that attention be given drains, etc., on this street. The matter will receive attention of the Engineer.

By arrangement the bands of the C. L. B. and C.C.C. will give concerts in Bannerman and Victoria Parks on Monday, Tuesday and Thursday nights at Bannerman Park, and on Friday nights at Victoria.

An application was received for one of the new houses the Council intends building at Quidi Vidi Road. If the Council receives the same privileges as those given the Dominion Co-operative Building Association by the Legislature in the exemption from duty on building materials, etc., the erection of more houses will be undertaken, otherwise the Council will not proceed with further erections.

Wm. Stowe will be permitted to build on Golf Ave., provided he is prepared to pay his proportion of cost of extending water and sewerage mains in this street.

Permits to make small erections and repairs were granted the following:—Imperial Tobacco Co., Edwin Snow, Cook Street; Thos. Pike, 70 Cabot Street; Geo. James, Barter's Hill; S. R. Winsor, Barnes Road; P. J. Bolger, Mullock Street; J. Marshall, Boncloddy Street; A. Pike, Barter's Hill; W. H. Parsons, Pleasant Street; T. Downey, Bell Street.

The following were deferred for further information: Mrs. Noel, Water Street West, must submit plans of proposed alterations; Balmer Johnston & Co., must submit block plan and location of proposed extension to their store.

Messrs. Jackman & Greene, Le-Marchant Road, will be permitted to build, provided building is in keeping with street level, so as to connect with sewer main, and if they give a guarantee to pay their proportion of cost of extending sewer main in this section.

George Herald, Bond Street, will be permitted to build concrete platform fronting his dwelling. The Engineer will give street levels.

George Butt, Franklin Ave., plans submitted were approved, provided he connects with the water and sewer mains.

A. Worrall is to be notified to have 1 Hamilton Street put in tenable condition.

Reports of City Health Officer, City Engineer and other officers were read, after which the meeting adjourned.
