### To Raise Revenue From Billboards

MONTREAL, Que., May 10.—(By Canadian Press)—For years this city has presented a strange spectacle to the visitor in the shape of theatrical billboards on which pieces of paper have been clumsily stuck over such things as revolvers or knives. This censoring was carried on by a city official. Now Montreal is to go a step further and magazine book covers,

paintings or drawings which may be exhibited publicly can be "purified" by this censor. The city also hopes to raise a little revenue out of the process and before the official stamp "approved" can be secured so much per foot of the poster must be paid. A fine of forty dollars or two months in jail is the penalty to be imposed for dodging inspection.

### 3 Generations, 224 Years

Mrs. Dill, aged 101, widow of Dr. Richard Dill, who lived to the age of 89, has died at Hove. Her father, General Sir Charles Wall, was at the siege of Gibraltar, 1781, and died at the age of 81.

Her grandfather was born in 1701—before the victory of Marlborough at Blenheim (1704). Three successive generations have thus covered 224 years.

### Mme. Caillaux Again a Social Leader in Paris

At a reception at the British Embassy attended by practically all the ministers of the Poincaré Government, and their wives Madame Caillaux, in pink georgette with close bobbed hair, was the centre of interest. She is a brilliant conversationalist.

It is now nearly nine years since Mme. Caillaux shot and killed Gaston Calmette, editor of the Figaro, because of attacks upon her husband who at the time was Minister of Finance in a cabinet of which the present President Doumergue was Premier.

Friends of the slain editor claimed Calmette had been about to expose Caillaux's dealings with Germany.

Madame Caillaux said her victim had threatened to publish letters exchanged between her and her husband before either had obtained the divorce that made their marriage possible. Caillaux's private life had always been an open target for his enemies.

A French jury found Madame Caillaux not guilty, but the storm that was aroused by the incident drove her husband from the cabinet.

Then in January, 1918 came Caillaux's arrest upon orders of Premier Georges Clemenceau. After two years under guard he was convicted of commerce and correspondence with the enemy, something akin to treason.

Mme. Caillaux suffered the vicissitudes of banishment with her husband, who was deprived of his political rights and forbidden to enter the larger cities of France.

Now with her husband's return to power, she is again in the foremost rank of French society and making the most of it.

The total number of locomotives, passenger coaches and freight cars built and purchased by the four groups composing the railway transportation system of Great Britain during the years 1923 and 1924, according to official statistics received by the Bankers Trust Company of New York through its British Information Service, were as follows:

Steam Locomotives—  
Year 1923—Built in the Companies' Shops—232. Purchased—28.

Year 1924—Built in the Companies' Shops—231. Purchased—241.

Passenger Coaches—  
Year 1923—Built in the Companies' Shops—543. Purchased—28.

Year 1924—Built in the Companies' Shops—784. Purchased—28.

Freight Cars—  
Year 1923—Built in the Companies' Shops—17,200. Purchased—4,521.

Year 1924—Built in the Companies' Shops—24,797. Purchased—6,777.

The figures include a certain number of units purchased from other companies, etc., and in particular 125 locomotives purchased from the Government in 1924.

### Our Trial by Jury

How It Differs From That of Other Lands.

The thing that impresses a foreigner at an important trial in this country is the absolute quietness of the whole proceedings. That is because the great point of the English trial is to exclude sentiment.

In the United States, however, it is different. Over there, weeks may have been spent in "challenging" the jury. One member ten years before argued against capital punishment, or in favour of it. Obviously, then, he is biased, and one or other of the counsel engaged will object to him.

When at last a jury is obtained to which no objection can be raised, the first thing that happens during the hearing of the case is that both counsels try their utmost to touch their feelings.

With us, the jury has nothing to do with sentiment. Their one business is to make a finding of fact from the evidence presented to them.

If the jury bring in a verdict of "guilty," and the quiet old gentleman, who is the judge, sentences the accused person to death, the prisoner has the right by law to appeal—but only on points of law.

There will be no jury, no evidence of facts, and no recital of the crime. Only a bench of judges of appeal arguing points of hard law as to whether this point and that ought to have been put to the court—in other words, whether or not the prisoner had a fair trial.

In France, again, things are very different. There a bench of judges acts as prosecuting counsel, as deciding jury, and as sentencing judge, all in one.

"Why, prisoner," they demand, "did you kill the man?"

Little by little the supposed details of the crime are "reconstructed." In the end, something like the truth is generally reached. Either the prisoner breaks down under the ordeal, or establishes his innocence, against the pitiless questioning.

But there is much to be said for the quiet dignity of the English Court, with its strained silence, its almost cloistered jurors, and its attentive judge.

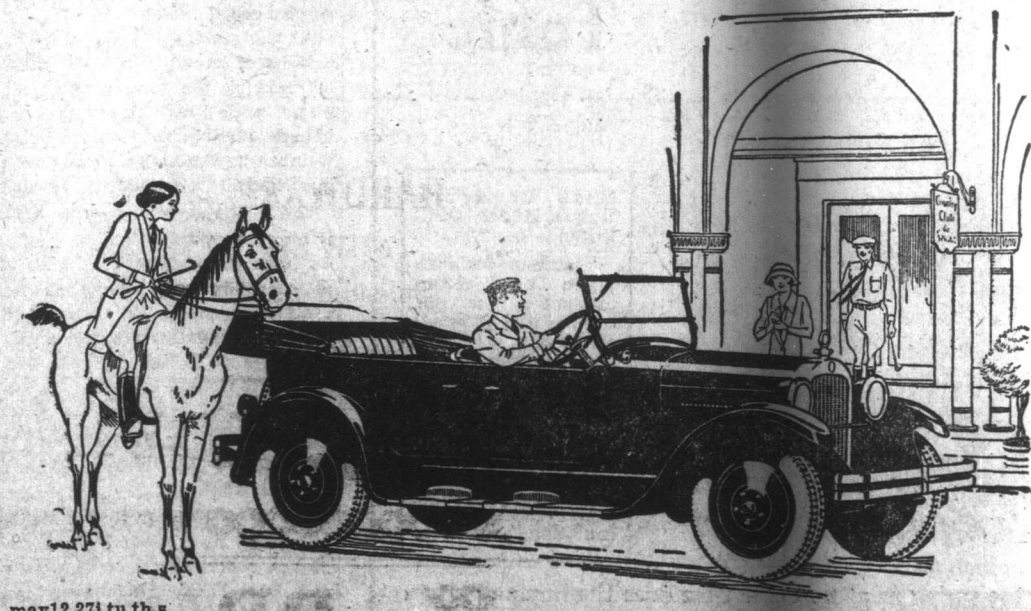
