ANTHRACITE STRIKE CALLED.

PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 27.

National President John L.

Lewis of the United Mine Workers of

America, ordered suspension of work

in the Anthracite fields of Pennsylv-

ania effective at midnight, August 31st,

the date of expiry of the present

contract with the operators. About

15,000 miners will be affected.

The miners demand 10 per cent. increase,

adoption of check-off and other con-

cessions, and if negotiations become

deadlocked, maintenance men expected

to continue working.

RUM ROW VACATED.

the coastguard declared the vigilance

would be maintained summer and win-

ter so long as rum ships continue

their effort to smuggle liquor into the

States.

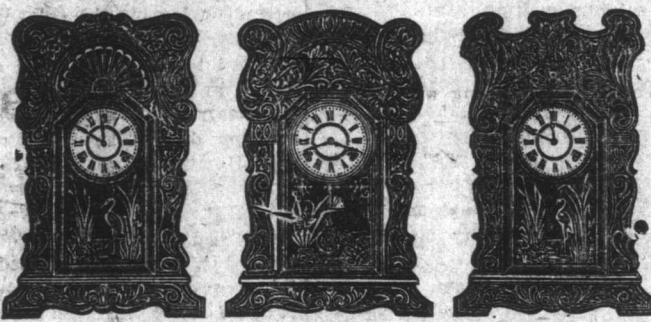

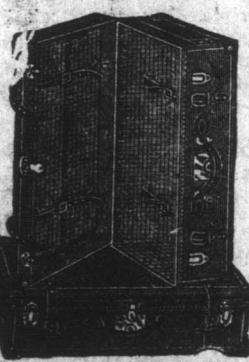

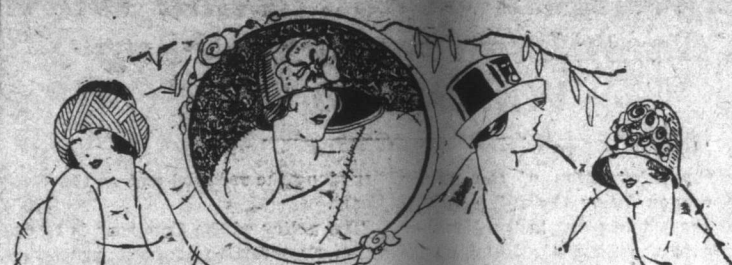
