Cruel neglect having been charged in con-nection with the death of Fred Springer, the victim of the Glencoe acci-dent Tuesday, Reeve J. A. Leitch, of that village, writes in explanation; After Springer was injured by being run over by a freight car, he was carried to the

After Springer was injured by being run over by a freight car, he was carried to the station, which occupied some twenty minutes. I, as reeve of the village, sent after the three dectors who practice in Glencee, and there were none of them at home. In about 40 minutes one of them arrived on the scene. In the meantime the unfortunate fellow had bled very freely. I asked the doctor what he could do, for him, and he said he would not undertake to amputate the limb alone. I thought then of sending to London for a surgeon, and I asked the G. T. R. operator how the train was from the east, and he stated three hours late. I then found out there was a special train coming from the west, and I had Springer put aboard the train upon a stretcher, and I sent a medical student along with him. The reason I did so was because he would arrive in London two hours before we could get a competent surgeon from London. I also asked the doctor if he had the man fixed up so he would go to London safely, and he stated he had. As regards the ambulance not being at the station, somebody at the hospital must be to blame, for as soon as the train left Glencoe I telephoned to the hospital that the man was coming on a special train and to have everything ready, and they replied all right. I did everything which lay in my power to relieve the poor man's suffering, and could not have done more had he been my nearest friend. I desire to state that there is not an ounce of inhumanity in my whole composition. I am quite willing that there shall be the closest inquiry and investigation into the whole matter, feeling satisfied that those people who were present at Glencoe will

Russian Troops Gathering on the Aus trian Frontier and Forts Being Hastily Constructed.

Hastily Constructed.

London, Aug. 21.—The Standard's correspondent at Braila reports an enormous increase of the Russian troops on the Austrian frontier. He says the Bessarabia frontier guards, formerly a gendarmery corps to prevent smuggling, have grown into a permanent advance guard ready to invade Austria on a few hours' notice. Large forts and other works are being rapidly built, and the Russian Government has given a heavy subsidy to the Black Sea and Danube Shipping Company to crect a large dock yard at Renia and to forward troops to any part of the Black Sea. The construction of pontoons is actively proceeding at Renia for the transportation of troops.
