FOOTBALL.

ROUGH GAME AT GRIMSBY. GRIMSBY, Eng., Sept. 18.—The football match here yesterday resulted in the defeat of the Canadian-American team by 1-0.

It was the roughest game the visitors have had on their tour, and several were severely injured. It was the rough work of Grimsby Town and not the good play that decided the match.

THE WESTERN TIES.

The W. F. A. Committee found it impossible to make out a satisfactory schedule, so the tie system as been adopted as follows:

Sept. 19—Preston vs. Galt, Detroit vs. Chatham.

Sept. 26—Galt vs. Preston, Chatham vs. Detroit.

Oct. 3—Essex vs. winners Chatham-Detroit, Woodstock vs. winners Galt-Preston.

Oct. 10—Winners Woodstock-Galt-Preston vs. winners Essex-Chatham-Detroit.

Oct. 17—Same reversed.

The matches must be played on the dates unless some previous date is mutually agreed upon. First club to have choice of ground. The second tie to have choice of ground.

One game, Essex and Woodstock having the option of having game on their own grounds, provided they agree to meet expenses, otherwise the game is played away on an equal basis of division.

Neither the Berlin Rangers nor Seaford Hurons have entered the contest.

BASEBALL.

The committee appointed by the National League to confer with the Association regarding a settlement report that they were to have a division to meet Association representatives, but at each place there was a hitch and they accomplished nothing. The debate hinges upon the advisability of conferring with the Association. The Boston men oppose a compromise, and are backed up by New York. Nearly all the other clubs are thought to be in favor of a compromise.

Only two or three clubs are willing to meet money and the rest are anxious for peace.

A CHALLENGE TO THE STARS.

The following has been received over the signature of "Alert": "The score published in your paper Monday of the game played between the Stars and Alerts is a very unfair and misleading one to the public and the Alerts. Collins was hit for nine base hits in place of five, and the Stars did not win a single run in place of four as tabulated in the summary. As far as the championship of the city is concerned, we do not think the Stars have any claim whatever to it, as they have not played any game with the Grand Trunk, who have repeatedly asked them to play, while the Alerts have played with the Athletics and Stars and won a majority of all games played far in excess by percentage than the Stars decimal will show. We have also played our own 'stars' in all but one of our games, whilst the Alerts have drawn from all the clubs in the city for their men. True they have beaten us three out of five games played, yet to give them a chance to prove their superiority over us we will back our club, the same men with one exception (giving them the same privilege), for a stake of \$50 a side. The game to be played on Saturday, Sept. 26, at 3:30 p.m., a mutual and financial umpire to be secured. Should the Stars win we will, with pleasure, acknowledge their superiority and sustain them in their claim as champions of the city."

At latest accounts the trotter Henry R. injured in the railroad accident near Hamilton, was not dead, as reported. It was at first decided to shoot him, but an effort is now being made to save the animal's life.

Mr. James McDonald, of the Queen's Hotel, Carling street, had a fine filly dropped Thursday, sired by Moorlight (9,337), dam Fox, by Ranger, son of Sheppard's Hambletonian. It is a full sister to his grand yearling stallion Sunlight.

At the meeting of the Horse and Hunt Trotting Association, beginning Oct. 6, 2-year-old Monbars will trot against Sun's 2-year-old record, 2:18, and Nancy Hanks will go against the time of Maud S., 2:08.

In the 2:20 pacing race at Rahville Ind., on Thursday, Lady Via won, Jack Shell second, Tillie Herr third. Best time, 2:17. Guy G. won the free-for-all pacing race in three straight heats. Telegram second, Major Wonder third. Time, 2:13, 2:14, 2:13.

THE TORONTO INDUSTRIAL.

American Visitors' Day—Another Large Turnout—A Busted Balloon—Interesting Exhibits.

TORONTO, Sept. 18.—The exhibition yesterday was a success. A large number of the Governor-General and suite. His Excellency highly praised the exhibits in different buildings and spent a couple of hours sight-seeing. The Governor-General, Hon. John Dwyer and Mr. Joseph Tait, M.P., were the principal speakers at the luncheon.

Yesterday was American visitors' day, and there was a splendid turnout, the receipts being \$13,785, or \$800 ahead of the corresponding day last year. When Madame Zeno's fire balloon was partially inflated a great rent opened in the top, and, seeing the situation, she immediately ordered the men to let go. The other balloon, managed by George Zeno, was already inflated and the two left the ground together, sailing northward over the exhibition grounds.

Seeing that her balloon was rapidly collapsing, Madame Zeno cut loose and landed safely with her parachute in the flower garden of the Central Prison. George Zeno landed on the flat roof of an hotel on the corner of Queen and Niagara streets. The receipts on Wednesday were \$16,819 60, the largest in the history of the exhibition. This is a review day and the last of the great exhibition. Among the notable exhibits will be found:

HEINZMANN AT THE FRONT.

In all the years since the inception of the Toronto exhibition the stand of Heinemann & Co. has been one of the centres of attraction in the main building. The exhibition of the present year is no exception. All day long the citizens stood in groups around the exhibit listening to the strains of the famous Heinemann piano—the pioneer of Canadian musical instruments. Coates, Mus. Bac. of Oxford and Cambridge Universities, predicted a big sale for all the styles in America, and that prediction has been fully borne out. Examples of the grand and the concert piano, of the parlor grand and of the concert grand are also shown; these latter pianos having had of late a splendid sale. The musicians who show the power of the instrument are trained pianists, the chief player being Mr. W. J. Carkeek, who has long been connected with the Heinemann piano.

Dr. Castle tested this piano thoroughly, and after hearing it played upon at one of Arthur L'Estrange's concerts, in the Royal Albert Hall, decided to purchase.

The Inimitable Royal Midgits.

The audience that greeted the inimitable Royal Midgits last evening was a much larger one than that of the previous evening. London is favored with many first class attractions, but this company possesses elements of originality seen in few. A happier, merrier, more delightful and more interesting entertainment would be a marvel, indeed. The charm of the play is continuous, and the delight of the audience knows no relaxation while the curtain is up. In the more dazzling portions, particularly the specialties, one is forced into a nervous appreciation or convulsive laughter. Round after round of applause was showered on the tiny actors and actresses. Admiral Dot and Miss Jennie Quigley are exquisite in their parts. Little Chips' dancing and singing brought him three thundering recalls, responded to cheerfully. Major Doyle, the chief of police, was, as usual, too funny for anything. "Gulliver's Travels" will again be portrayed this afternoon and evening, with realistic exactness and the accessories of elegant costuming, splendid scenery, beautiful ballets and sparkling specialties. The Grand Opera House should be packed on both occasions.

TORONTO TOPICS.

Father McMahon's Will—Terribly Injured by a Street Car.

Toronto, Sept. 18.—Rev. Father Thomas C. McMahon, who died at Parkdale on Aug. 5, left real estate valued at \$2,000 and personally \$20,711. His executors are Archbishop Walsh and M. W. Mills, of Toronto. Ann Gaffney gets the household effects and what cash is in the Dominion Bank, and the rest is divided as follows: House of the Good Shepherd, \$4,000; House of Providence, \$4,000; General Hospital, \$3,000; Home for Incubables, \$2,000; St. Vincent de Paul Society, \$2,500; masses for the repose of the soul of the testator, \$300. The Sunnyside Orphanage gets the Ruth street property.

A shocking street railway accident occurred last night at the corner of Spadina avenue and King street, and may result in the death of Mr. Thos. Windross, of Port Robinson, a man about 30 years of age. While standing on the car he fell forward on the track, the wheels passing over him and nearly severing both legs and one arm. It was last night impossible to tell whether the unfortunate man would recover or not.

The bylaw prohibiting preaching in the parks on Sundays was sustained yesterday by Chief Justice Giesbrecht.

The body of an unknown man was found floating in the Don yesterday afternoon.

DOMINION PARLIAMENT.

OTTAWA, Sept. 18.—In the House today some useful amendments were made in the law governing controverted elections. The practice of filing petitions on the chance of being able to finish up evidence is checked by a proviso that the petitioner must testify to his belief that his protest is well founded. It is provided also that the counsel fee to be paid between party and party shall not exceed \$50 for the first day of the trial and \$40 for each succeeding day, and that the whole amount of the bill so to be taxed shall not exceed \$300. Mr. Mulock is the author of these amendments. Mr. Dalton McCarthy obtained the assent of the House to an amendment making it necessary to deposit, on making an appeal from the Election Court, \$500 instead of \$100. Mr. Laurier moved an amendment intended to prevent a curious anomaly in the election law. If the two judges of an appealing day had the same name as the petitioner he has his right to appeal, but where they disagree there can be no appeal because it is said there is no judgment to appeal from, though the effect is precisely the same as a judgment against him, namely, to leave the respondent in possession of the seat. Then follows this curious consequence that a petitioner is worse off when he has one judge in his favor than when both are against him. The amendment was opposed by the Minister of Justice, and defeated upon a vote of 33 to 32. Mr. McCarthy and Col. O'Brien voting with the Opposition.

The amendments that were made by the Senate to the bill respecting the Baie des Chaleurs Railway Company were concurred in without any discussion.

A bill from the Senate respecting frauds upon the Government passed its second reading. Sir John Thompson explained the bill in the same manner as did Hon. Mr. Abbott in the House before the Senate. It is arranged to have discussion on the bill next week, when it goes to Committee of the Whole.

After recess the bill to authorize the transfer of certain public property to Provincial Governments was considered in committee.

NOT FOR RUSSIA!

The Muscovite Cannot Control the Dardanelles.

LONDON, Sept. 19.—The British Foreign Office has received advice from Sir Wm. White, British ambassador at Constantinople, stating that the Russian Government is making a serious effort to secure the Dardanelles incident, with an urgent note repeating the Porte's request for an explanation. Sir William does not mention the receipt of a Russian note concerning the Dardanelles incident, on which the response ought to be based. The delaying of the reply tends to confirm the belief that Admiral Kerr acted under orders.

The Admiralty has received a report from Admiral Kerr, telegraphed through Constantinople, presumably through the medium of the Russian Government, if Admiral Kerr acted under instructions Lord Salisbury's explanations may rest upon the fact that the Porte had long accorded the privilege of manœuvring and drilling in the uplands of the Anatolian peninsula. The response will not be apologetic.

The Standard, in an article directly inspired if not written by Lord Salisbury's private secretary, says: "It is advisable to let the world know what the English Government will do. Russia will tell itself into a most dangerous delusion to imagine that Great Britain will under any circumstances suffer Russia to obtain command of the Dardanelles."

"Uncle Tom" Tells the Truth.

OTTAWA, Sept. 18.—Mr. Edgar Griffin has returned to the House of Commons. While at Portland Mr. Griffin had the honor of dining with Mr. Thomas McGreevy, the fugitive M. P. Uncle Thomas appears quite contented and says, like Mr. Rykert, that he is not as bad as dozens of other members of the House of Commons.

A Winton Girl Struck by Lightning.

WINTON, Sept. 18.—Yesterday afternoon during a sharp thunderstorm the residence of George Shaw, section boss, just across the rear of the Echo office, was badly wrecked by lightning. His daughter Eliza, about 18 years of age, was struck by the fluid, which passed down the whole length of her body, burning her hair and face and tearing one of her breasts to shreds. She will probably recover, although at present in a critical condition.

China Wants Peace—Another Royal Betrothal.

UNITED STATES.

Chas. A. Woodbury died at Salem, Mass., Wednesday of hydrophobia. The loss by the burning of the Memphis theater is placed at \$45,000; insurance, \$34,000. It was built in 1858.

Wednesday was the hottest September day ever known in Minnesota and the Dakotas, the thermometer registering 100° in the shade at many places.

CANADIAN.

A rich discovery of gold has been made in a mine in Marmora. Hon. Thos. McGreevy was in Quebec on Thursday night.

The steam tug King, of St. Catharines, was totally destroyed by fire off Tobemurray Friday.

Thunderstorms were general throughout Eastern Canada yesterday, accompanied by intense heat.

Finley Clark, of South Marysburg, near Efford, has died from the effects of injuries received while tending a threshing machine.

An inmate of the Rockwood Asylum named Hally was drowned off the wharf at the rear of that institution on Thursday. Deceased formerly lived in Toronto.

BRITISH AND FOREIGN.

The eldest son of the Crown Prince of Denmark has been betrothed to Princess Victoria of Wales.

In a recent interview Hippolyte expressed his great desire for peace, and claimed that Hayti was favorable to his rule.

Sir Julian Pauncefote, the British Minister at Washington, has called the attention of the Department of State to alleged violations of the modus vivendi respecting the maximum number of seals to be taken in Bering Sea.

The bodies of 1,200 victims of the flood at Consuegra, Spain, have been buried. The exact number of the victims is not known, but the lives of 60 persons by means of a hastily constructed raft of furniture secured from floating wreckage.

The Chinese Government, it is announced, is not aware of any threatened naval demonstration upon the part of the combined fleets of the powers. It is also stated there is no truth in the statement that the Chinese Government has sent a note to the powers regarding the out-rages complained of by the foreign ministers.

The Novoe Vremya, of St. Petersburg, referring to the Sighi incident says: "The clearest explanations are required from England and those responsible for the landing on the Island of Mitylene should be punished. The powers in sympathy with the Sultan will unite to prevent England from committing arbitrary acts which endanger the security of Turkey."
