An Earthquake Turns People

Out of Their Beds.

The Masonic Temple at Napa Shattered —San Francisco Feels the Shock.

NAPA, Cal., Oct. 12.—The heaviest earthquake shock ever felt here was experienced at 10:34 last night. People rushed into the streets in their night clothes in great excitement. Chimneys were toppled over, and several buildings were shattered and badly shaken up. Drug store fixtures suffered greatly, bottles being thrown from the shelves to the floor, and other damage was done. The Masonic Temple, a fine building, was shattered. At the State Insane Asylum great excitement prevailed, the patients being almost uncontrollable. It is reported the building cracked and that other damage was done.

SAN FRANCISCO FELLS IT.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Oct. 12.—A severe earthquake shock occurred here at 10:27 last night. It lasted fully half a minute and was the most severe experienced in this city for a long time. As far as known, however, no serious damage was done.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Oct. 13.—The effects of the earthquake which visited some portions of North California Sunday night appear to have been greatest in Napa and Sonoma Valley, where the shock is described as being the heaviest experienced since the great quake of 1868. At Napa and Sonoma the walls cracked, chimneys were demolished, and in some instances falling through the roofs. Window glass was broken, people were roused from their beds, and many passed the night in the streets. The heaviest shock occurred at 10:30 last night and lasted from 10 to 45 seconds, according to localities where noted. The general direction seemed to be from northeast to southeast. On Popula ranch, near Sonoma, the earthquake caused water to gush forth in great quantities.
