RICH IN GOLD.

New Mining District Discovered in Northwestern Ontario.

Toronto, Nov. 19 .- A new mining district has been discovered in North-western Ontario, which is so rich in gold that it is called "the new Klondike." In the report of J. A. Bow, inspector of mines in that part of the province, the Klondike lies about eight miles south of Tache station, on the Canadian Pacific, and is around Shallow, Stormy and Long Lakes, and the Little Wabigoon River. From pannings, which Inspector Bow made, he believes the country to be very rich, though little assaying has as yet been done. In the quartz there is a large quantity of copper pyrites and malachite. Iron pyrites are also plentiful in the vein. The veins run in all directions, and are usually quite large, some of the outcropping being eight feet wide. "From all appearances," says Mr. Bow, "I would think that it will prove one of the richest sections of the country." Already a number of applications for lots in the new district have been filed in the crown lands department, and many prospectors are on the ground.




