TORONTO, Oct. 10.—11 p.m.—The im-
portant storm, central near Cape Hatteras
yesterday, is now central over Maine. It
has caused a strong gale and heavy rain
along the Atlantic coast, and is now giving
a strong east and south gale and heavy rain
in the Maritime Provinces and over Que-
bec. The pressure is rising in the lake
region and is about stationary in the North-
west.

GEORGE SCEALEY'S DEATH.

His Daughter Takes Action to Set
Aside the Will—A Curious Case
Recalled.

The mysterious death of George Scealey,
of Vienna, two or three months ago, which
the coroner's jury decided was occasioned
by poison administered by some person
unknown, but the investigation of which the
Attorney-General's department have so far
declined to take up owing to the post-
mortem was conducted, was inquired into
at Osprey Hall, Toronto, Monday, when
Scealey's only surviving daughter, Mrs.
Henry Whitesell, who was not made a
legatee under the will, brought action to
set the testament aside. Under the will
the \$14,000 worth of property which
Scealey possessed was left to Sarah Jane
Robbins, with whom he lived, and Murphy
H. Best, a relative of the Robbins woman.
It was owing to this will and the disinheri-
ting of his daughter that steps were first
taken to investigate the cause of Scealey's
death.—[St. Thomas Journal.]

KINGSTON, Oct. 10.—Today the sixth

and the court opened. The room was

jury filed out a deathly silence prevailed.
When the verdict of "not guilty" was ren-
dered and the prisoner was lectured and
finally discharged, he thanked the judge,
and going over to his lawyer, Mr. Mc-
Lennan, shook his hand warmly and the
court adjourned.
