GEORGE SCEALEY'S DEATH. His Daughter Takes Action to Set Aside the Will-A Curious Case

Recalled. The mysterious death of George Scealey. of Vienna, two or three months ago, which the coroner's jury decided was occasioned by poison administered by some person unknown, but the investigation of which the Attorney-General's department have so far declined to take up owing to the slovenly manner in which the postmortem was conducted, was inquired into at Osgoode Hall, Toronto, Monday, when Scealey's only surviving daughter, Mrs. Henry Whitesell, who was not made a legatee under the will, brought action to set the testament aside. Under the will the \$14,000 worth of property which Scealey possessed was left to Sarah Jane Robbins, with whom he lived, and Murphy H. Best, a relative of the Robbins woman. It was owing to this will and the disinheriting of his daughtor that steps were first taken to investigate the cause of Scealey's death .- [St. Thomas Journal.
