London, April 15 .- The Athens correspondent of the Times says that, acording to a member of the Ethnike Hetairia, the insurgents, who have returned across the frontier are only those who were unable to follow their nore active companions. Seven Fires Inside of Five Hours in the Business Section

Kansas City, Mo., April 15 .- Since 9 o'clock last night Kansas City seems to have been at the mercy of a band of incendiaries. Between 9 o'clock last night and 1 o'clock this (Thursday) morning seven fires broke out in the business center of the city. At least four, and probably all, of those fires were of incendiary origin. While the majority of the blazes were extinguished in their incipiency, two of them resulted in heavy damages. The big five-story Scarritt block in Walnut street, corner Ninth, was deentailing a loss of \$60,000. to an adjoining structure in Main street, also owned by the Scarritt estate, and occupied by the Campbell & Eaton Crockery Company. The building on Main street was damaged to the extent of \$10,000, and the crockery ock suffered an equal damage. Only y a very narrow margin were other adjoining buildings saved from de-
