A BEAUTIFUL BRIDE.

Love Letter Written by the King of Egypt 35,000 Years Ago.

Once upon a time, before Rome was dreamt of—a king of Egypt wrote to a king of Babylonia, asking his daughter's hand in marriage. The King of Babylonia, being a most unromantic parent, decided not to enter into any such arrangement until he had sub-stantial proof of the royal suitor's worthiness and honorable intentions, then followed a long correspondence, which, wonderful to state, was very much like the correspondence that ensues today when an European monarch They died, did these two kings, and 35 centuries rolled slowly over their graves, and the world grew to be vastly different from what it once was, and yet remained vastly the same. In the year 1888, a peasant woman, seek-ing antiquities among the ruins near form characters. In the course of time these tablets reached one Hugo Winckler, a young Assyriologist, who translated them, among others, and now from the press of Reuther & Reichard, of Berlin, there has just been issued a little book entitled, "The l-el-Amarna Letters." The Nibmur aria referred to below has been identified with Amenhotep, who reigned over Egypt about 1415 B.C. This Nibnuaria had married the sister of the Babylonian king, Kallima-Sin, and polygamy being much in vogue at that time, had expressed a desire to marry Kallima-Sin's daughter also. The Babylonian king, however, hesitated, because he did not know how well his sister had been treated. Here you may read this curious correspondent

for yourself:
"To Nibmuaria, the great king, the
King of Egypt, my bröther: From
Kallima-Sin, King of Kardunias, your
brother, I am well; may you be well; with your house, your wives, your sons, your chief men, your horses, your chariots, and your lands, may it be very well. I am well, with my house, my wives, my sons, my chief men, my horses, my chariots, my people, it is very well, and with my ands very well.

"Verily, I have heard the communication which you have written me, namely: You wish, indeed, my daughter to wife, although my sister, whom my father gave you, is there with you, and no one has seen her as yet, whether she is alive, or whether she is dead." And then the letter goes on to sug-

gest that the King of Egypt, having obtained a wife from the court of Babylonia, it would be but fair to him to return the compliment by sending one of his own daughters to wed the Babylonian monarch. This suggestion eems to have met with the tian king's approval. Possibly he approved out of selfish motives, seeing in the arrangement a way to his own desires being granted; at any rate, he replied as follows:
