He had always secured the good will of the citizens in the cities in which he had operated by the efficiency of the service offered, and he wished to do the same thing with London. "There is no room," he conoffered, and he wished to do the same thing with London. "There is no room," he consided, "in this city for the two systems. I will tell you that now. One of us will go down." In placing their proposition before the council, they had not been actuated by any desire to harass the old company. They wanted to do business. He wanted the committee to remember, however that in giving a franchise to the old company not a single additional man would be employed, whereas the new company would bring 100 neres as the new company would bring 100 neres.

Mr. Hellmuth remarked that he had nothing to say other than that his clients were unprepared to bid against another organization. His clients wanted their proposition considered by itself, not alongside of that of any other person. "You have only got a right to a horse and mule franchine."
