a Cabinet. LI MAY COME BACK. London, June 18 .- Official changes at Pekin says a dispatch to the Daily Mail from Tien Tsin foreshadows the return of Li Hung Chang to power. His influence is predominant in the Tsung Li Yamen, and he is strongly biased in favor of the Russians.

ANOTHER CABINET CRISIS. Rome, June 18 .- In the chamber of deputies today, the premier, the Marquis di Rudini, announced that the ministry, which was only formed on May 31, has resigned. ministry which has just resigned only presented itself to the chamber of deputies on Thursday last.

NO BRITISH NAVAL MANEUVERS. London, June 18.—It is announced Universal reputation. that Great Britain will not hold her usual annual naval maneuvers this years. This has caused much speculation as to the reason for this step. The officials of the British admiralty decline to give their reasons for abandoning the maneuvers, but say it is not because of lack of coal.

NO FRENCH CABINET YET. Paris. June 18 .- After consultation with MM. Peytral, Sarren and Dupuy is morning, M. Ribot informed President Faure that he is unable to form a cabinet to succed the Meline ministry. President Faure accepted the letters of resignation on June 15 (Wednesday last).

THEY LINGER. Rome, June 18.-Amid considerable excitement, the Marquis Di Rudini said that after considering the parliamentary situation, and in order not to prejudice a grave public question, ministers had placed their resignations in the hands of the king, who reserved the right of decision relative to their acceptance. The ministry would remain in office for the present in order to at tend to routine business and safeguare public order. He then begged the chamber to suspend its sittings.

The returns thus far assure the election of 34 Conservatives, 6 Imperialists, 71 Centrists, 4 Reformists. 6 National Liberals. 2 candidates of the Radical Union, 32 Social Democrats, 11 Poles, 1 Dane and 7 Independents. It is imposible as yet to predict the composition of the new reichstag. The crisis will occur on the second ballots. The Centrists will, as heretofore, hold the balance of power, with 100 seats, enabling them to sway the reichstag in either direction. The increase in the Socialist vote is most marked at Wurtemburg. Already it is causing alarm among the Hamburgers. Owing to his feeble condition, Prince Bismarck did not vote.
