WITH A BROKEN BACKBONE. Crippled Condition of the Coal Combine —How the Knockout Was Caused.

—How the Knockout Was Caused.

New York, Jan. 10,—The Herald says the backbone of the Reading coal combine has been breken by the withdrawal of the Jersey Central and gives the following as the reason for the latter road's action: The essence of Mr. McLeod's scheme was that the Reading, Lehigh Valley and Jersey Central could get the greater part of the business and control the output of anthractic coal. cite coal.

The Jersey Central's output for 1892 was 6,000,000 tons, but the Reading was unable to sell more than 5,500,000 tons. Consequently the Central lost the profit on 500,000 tons, amounting to \$750,000.

The Reading lost 300,000 tons, the Lebigh Valley lost something, but the Delaware, Lackawanna and Western were gainers, because they mined and sold their ful quota. This showing displeased the Jersey Central directors. The rates established by McLeod gave it a better revenue for 1891, but the earnings should have been greater.

A committee was appointed by the Jersey Central directors to look into the situation, and, if necessary, break the contract with the Reading. The committee asked McLeod how he was going to make up the 500,000 tons he failed to sell for the Jersey Central. He made no satisfactory explanation and the committee replied that they would have to take charge of their own business. President Maxwell verifies the above. "We have withdrawn from the combine," he said, "because we did not get our share of the business last year."

"You will be free to make your own rates now," was suggested.

"We shall establish rates that will enable us to sell our share of the tonnage. There is no reason for cutting rates," was the reply.
