#### JOB'S RESTORATION.

LESSON IV, SECOND QUARTER, INTER-NATIONAL SERIES, APRIL 23.

Text of the Lesson, Job xlii, 1-10—Golden Text, James v, 11—Doctrinal Suggestion, the Omnipotence of God-Commentary

on the Lesson by the Rev. D. M. Stearns.

1. "Then Job answered the Lord and said." After a time the three men ceased to answer Job, because he was righteous in his own eyes and justified himself rather than God (chapter xxxii, 1, 2). Then to the end of chapter xxxvii we have the wise and weighty words of Elihu (the name signifies "God Himself") speaking on God's behalf (xxxvi, 2), to which Job makes no reply. From xxxviii, 1, to xli, 34, Jehovah speaks, and now for the first time since the three friends stopped, with the exception of chapter xl, 3-5, Job makes reply, but we shall hear him as an entirely different man from the one who made reply to Eliphaz and the others, giving them as good as they gave him.

2. "I know that Thou canst do everything, and that no thought can be with holden from Thee." It is a good and help-ful thing to believe that God can do every fold thing to believe that God can do everything, and that nothing is too hard or wonderful for Him (Jer. xxxii, 17). Sarah stumbled here, and so did Moses and the 10 spies and hosts of others (Gen xviii, 13, 14; Num. xi, 21-23; xiii, 31, 33). Let is also believe that no purpose of God can be fustrated (Ps. xxxiii, 11; Isa, xiv 24), and since His ways and thoughts are as far above ours as heaven is above the earth (Isa. lv, 8, 9) let us away with ours, however attractive to ourselves, and be filled with His, which are sure of accomplishment. are sure of accomplishment.

3. "Who is he that hideth counsel without knowledge? Therefore have I uttered that I understood not: things too wonderful for me that I knew not." The words of Jehovah had taken hold of him (chapter xxxviii, 2,3) and laid him low, exposing his folly. Elihu had spoken wisely when he said, "We cannot order our speech by reason of darkness" (chapter xxxvii, 19).

Job had talked thus foolishly (xiii, 22), and God had given him back his own words (xxxviii, 3; xl, 7), and it would seem that Job now quotes them in deep humility and self-condemnation, for he had already said: "I will lay mine hand upon my mouth. Once have I spoken, but I will not answer. Yea, twice, but I will proceed no further" (xl, 4.5.

5. "I have heard of thee by the hearing of the ear, but now mine eye seeth thee. It is to be feared that much hearing of the gospel is merely a hearing by the ear. In

fact, He who is perfect in knowledge
(xxxvi, 4) told us in the parable of the
sower that it would be so. The question
for us is, "How do I hear?" For the Savfour teaches us to "take head how we hear
and what we hear" (Mark iv, 24; Luke viii,
18). As to seeing God, it is written,
"Blessed are the pure in heart, for they
shall see God" (Math v, 8). But God said
to Moses, "There shall no man see Me and
live" (Ex. xxxiii, 20). And yet again it is
said. "They saw God and did eat and
drink" (Ex. xxxii, 11). The key to these
savings is probably found in John 1, 18.

DOCTORS ON INEBRIETY.

DOCTORS ON INEBRIETY.

A special meeting of the American Association for the Study and Cure of Inebriety was held at the New York Academy of Medicine recently. The subject discussed was "Specific remedies for the treatment and cure of alcohol and opium inebriety." Several papers had been prepared, among them being one from Dr. Norman Kerr, of London. Dr. Albert Day, president, opened the meeting with remarks on the tendency of the mind to influence the cure of disease as bearing upon the efficacy upon so-called specific remedies. Dr. T. D. Crothers, editor of the Journal of Inebriety, read a strong paper condemning such specific remedies. Inebriety, said he, is a species of insanity that can no more be cured by a patent medicine than insanity itself. Dr. Norman Kerr's paper mercilessly ridiculed the so-called "gold cure." Dr. Frederick Peterson. said: "If I were to suggest an ideal means of dealing with inebriety, it would be the establishment of a little world in which alcohol has no place, but in which life, with its various occupations, domestic arrangements and amusements, goes exactly on the same as now. The problem involved is merely the exclusion of alcohol from all part in the colony's affairs. In fact, the colony should be quarantined against the introduction of alcohol as if it were a coma bacillus or the microbe of the Black Death."

#### LEGAL QUERIES.
