ALD. COOPER PRODUCES AFFIDAVIT.

Succeeds in Reading It Despite Protests.

"Thought You Could Down Me," He Says, and Proves Otherwise.

Sworn Evidence on the Winnett Matter—Declaration Includes a Second Charge—Was Sworn to Before Cooper Himself—Defendant Exonerated.

July 6, 1901.

I, Thomas Ings, do hereby make oath and say that I did and was working for Ald. Winnett last year and part of this, and that I did deliver for the said Ald. Winnett scuttlings, and also boards, made by McKinley lumber, supplied by the said Mr. Ald. Winnett to the contractors laying down the cement walks in this city, and also, I did deliver coal and wood to the smallpox hospital for the said Ald. Winnett, for the city, and am prepared to go to any court of law and declare the same to be true.

Witness, MRS. MARY GOODWIN.
Sworn before me, Neil Cooper, this day, July 6, 1901.

This sworn declaration, read in open council last night by Ald. Cooper, was the center of a very whirlwind of words. Ald. Cooper had come to the city hall primed for a conflict, and ready to show that what he had said regarding Ald. Winnett's connection with civic contracts was true. He did not at all like the treatment that he had received at the meeting of No. 1 committee Friday night, nor did he like the idea of it going abroad that he had been beaten; that, in fact, he had charged, but could not prove. His purpose last night was to show that he would not only charge, but was prepared to stand the test of veracity. Friday night's meeting he had said that it was all very well, that on the grounds that it had nothing to do with the matter under discussion, viz., the report upon the investigation of the finance committee, and Ald. Campbell

and Ald. Olmsted urged the mayor to rule as to Ald. Cooper's right. Other members contended that it should not be allowed, but Mayor Rumball was of opinion that if it had anything to do with this year's matter it should be allowed. Ald. Cooper was persistent; not only did he read the affidavit, but he declared he would have had the man who made it before the committee Friday night, had not Ald. Winnett sent his foreman to keep him from attending. Ald. Winnett spoke just once, to deny that he did this, but Ald. Cooper threw out the challenge to take the matter to court, and he would prove all that he charged. He had intended, he said, to let the charge regarding the sale of lumber to contractors suffice, but since he had received such treatment, he had decided to add the one about the supply of coal and wood to the smallpox hospital. An added interest was depicted upon every countenance around the board when Ald. Greenlee began to read the following clause in No. 1 committee's report: "On the reference from council re investigation of complaint by Ald. Winnett, and Ald. Cooper's statement re sale of lumber, your committee begs to recommend that Ald. Cooper having failed to substantiate in any way his charge against Ald. Winnett, your committee recommends that the committee be dropped."

ALL EYES ON ALD. COOPER.

When Mayor Rumball asked if there were any objections Ald. Cooper rose and every eye was turned expectantly to him.

He had made a charge, and he intended to prove it.

tended to substantiate it. Everybody said that Cooper had failed to prove his charge. "I failed to get a witness, because the man charged sent his foreman to the main witness to keep him away from the committee."

Ald. Greenlee—I rise to a point of order.

Ald. Cooper—I have an affidavit. "I deny that I did such thing," interjected Ald. Winnett.

"I have a sworn affidavit," continued the undaunted Cooper.

"I take exception to all this," said Ald. Greenlee. "Ald. Cooper failed to substantiate his charges in committee. Now he wishes to force a trial before the whole council."

"I ask your ruling, your worship," Ald. Campbell said.

Ald. Olmsted—This was sent to No. 1 committee, your worship, and it has been reported.

Ald. Cooper, excitedly—If it can't stand the light of day, why, all right. It is not last year's matter, it is this year's. I suppose he's entitled to read it," the mayor said.

THE AFFIDAVIT READ.

Ald. Cooper read it, and added, triumphantly, "You men said in that committee and thought you could down Cooper in the matter; but you have found that you couldn't. Now, if it is not true, take it before the county judge and I'll prove it."

Ald. Greenlee asked Ald. Cooper if he was a commissioner to take affidavits.

"Yes, I am," he replied.

"It is very unusual for a commissioner to take an affidavit, so one-sided as this, and so much in his own favor. I am inclined to think it would be thrown out of court."

The council then adopted the report of the finance committee.

"I may take the matter before the county court yet," Ald. Cooper said subsequently, "and I may not."

COMMUNICATIONS.

Mayor Howland's proposal to hold a convention at Toronto, representative of the municipalities of Ontario was referred to his worship and the chairman of No. 1 committee with power.

Mayor Rumball said that in his opinion the present Ontario league had the same objects, but City Clerk Kingston stated that the new organization had a broader scope.

In response to a telegram from Cache Bay, \$50 was voted to be sent to the sufferers from the recent fire there.

The London Horticultural Society was granted the use of the city hall for their annual show on Aug. 5 and 6.

A local printing concern asked that the council vote \$100 to pay for the advertising that the city will get by means of an Old Boys' reunion souvenir. This was allowed on motion of Ald. Garratt.

COMMITTEES.

No. 2 committee recommended that an anti-spitting bylaw be passed, to become effective on Dundas and Richmond streets, between Wellington and Rideout and Maple and the G. T. R., respectively.

Ald. Jolly—Won't we require an extra police force to make this bylaw effective?

Ald. Winnett thought not, that the present force would suffice. All that was needed was a hint from a policeman. The movement would have a good educative effect.

To this Ald. Campbell agreed, and he moved in amendment that it apply to all places where there is a cement walk.

"Hadn't you better pass a bylaw prohibiting ladies from wearing long skirts, and wiping the streets?" asked Ald. Garratt.

Ald. Campbell—Hasn't Ald. Garratt been married long enough to know that to prohibit ladies doing anything would be dangerous?

The motion, as amended, was carried.

On Ald. Garratt's motion it will be compulsory in the future for all teamsters doing city work to use one-third cord boxes.

No. 2 committee reaffirmed its former recommendation that P. L. Marden & Co. and the Silica-Barytic Company be given the contract for cement kerbing. At last council meeting the tenders were referred back with orders to advertise for new ones, and it was said a number of contractors had not tendered because they knew nothing of the matter. Such was not the case apparently, as only one man tendered the second time. He was one of the first tenderers, and on the second occasion he made his figures very low. It was considered unfair to take such advantage of the former lowest tenderers, and the contract was again given to them.

The committee's report contained the following clause: "That as an inducement to property owners to have their streets paved, the city pay one-quarter the total cost of the pavement of a street, which has never before been paved; and on those streets that have been paved previously, and require repaving, the city pay one-third of the total cost." Carried.

A clause in No. 1 committee's report referring to the South street lot time was referred back. Ex-Ald. Bennett, speaking for himself and other residents of Rectory street, asked that this be done so as to give them future opportunities to study the matter.

INQUIRIES.

Ald. Jolly—Had the city engineer started to have the weeds in the city cut? To which Ald. Winnett replied that the work was now being done.

Ald. Greenlee—Had the city engineer the right to do work aside from city work? The reply being, "No," he said that he had done a very improper thing in putting his name to certain outside plans.

Ald. Cronyn—Had the board of works done anything towards making bicycle paths or treating the streets so as to make them better adapted for bicycling? No, it hadn't, he was told; it had no money for such a purpose. He therefore gave notice of motion that the board construct special paths or strips along thoroughfares that are not now good for bicycling.

Ald. Garratt's motion to reconsider the decision to make no grant to the Old Boys' committee was negatived—six voting for and five against—and a two-thirds vote was required.

WAS JUST FOUR YEARS TOO LATE!

Wealthy Idaho Miner Came Home to Find His Friends He Had Worked for Were Dead.

Owensboro, Ky., July 9.—B. B. Widtmer, a wealthy miner from Seven Devils Hill, Idaho, stepped from St. Louis train last Friday and began a search for a sister-in-law who formerly lived here. No one at the depot could tell him about her, and he came on down into town, inquiring of people as he met them as to Mrs. Pauline Widtmer's residence.

Finally he found someone who remembered the tragic suicide on the night of June 30, 1897, of Mrs. Widtmer and her only child, Pauline, and told him the circumstances attending the death of herself and daughter.

The poor man became grief-stricken. He had come all the way from Idaho, bringing with him 20 \$500 bills to give to his sister-in-law and her daughter, and to take them with him to his mining camp in Idaho. He expected to find them alive and well.

Widtmer and his brother came here 30 years ago from Switzerland. They operated a small dye works establishment, but it did not pay, and he went west to seek his fortune. His brother soon died, leaving a widow and daughter. The brother kept up a correspondence with the family until his brother's death, and at intervals afterwards with the widow and daughter, but nothing had been heard from him by them for a number of years and they supposed him to be dead.

The poor woman and daughter were in extreme poverty, and on the morning of July 1, 1897, they were both found dead in their bed. They had suicided the night before by means of carbolic acid. Widtmer had grown rich in an Idaho mining camp. He wanted to make life happy for the widow and daughter of his dead brother, and was almost crazed with grief when he came here and learned of their tragic death four years ago. He is a bachelor and 50 years old.
