

DIVISIONAL COURT.

Before Boyd, C., Ferguson, J.-Stubbs vs. Struthers-Judgment (G. A. B.) on appeal by defendant from report of master at Guelph in so far as it finds that the defendant has not paid the whole of the sum of \$3,000, which he agreed to pay to the firm under the articles of partnership between him and plaintiff, but only \$2,475. It was contended for defendant that the evidence showed that he had given his note to the firm for \$700, which was discounted, and proceeds used to take up a maturing note of the firm, made for the balance of the \$3,000, at the time of the formation af the partnership; that defendant paid \$175 on account of this \$700 note, which defendant has paid since the dissolution, and that if he is entitled to credit for the \$175 paid he is equally entitled to the \$525. Held, that the evidence is not sufficient to displace the legal aspect of the case as regards liability on the two notes in question. There was really no liability of the firm on these notes unless the maker failed to pay, and when he did pay it was his own obligation, and not as a purchaser of firm assets. On the other hand, if the basis of adjustment was the balance sheet, then it is apparent that these two notes were reckoned in arriving at the result. Appeal dismissed with costs. A. G. Macdonald, K. C., for defendant; G. C. Gibbons, K. C., for plaintiff.

ANOTHER NAVAL ACCIDENT. London, Dec. 4 .- The sinking of the torpedo destroyer Salmon causes great disquiet. It is difficult to escape the conclusion that there must be some common defect of construction be-sides even the proved tendency to buckling behind all these cases of mishap to torpedo destroyers.

MISS STONE ALIVE. Washington, Dec. 4.-The state department today received a cablegram from Spencer Eddy, United States charge of legation, at Constantinople, reporting that Miss Stone and her companion, Madame Tsilka, are held prisoners at a place called Gultepe on the south side of the mountains.






