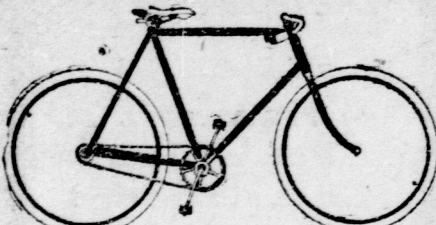

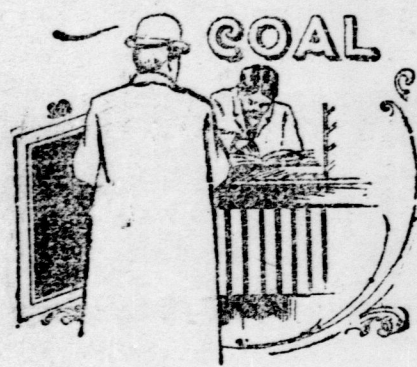

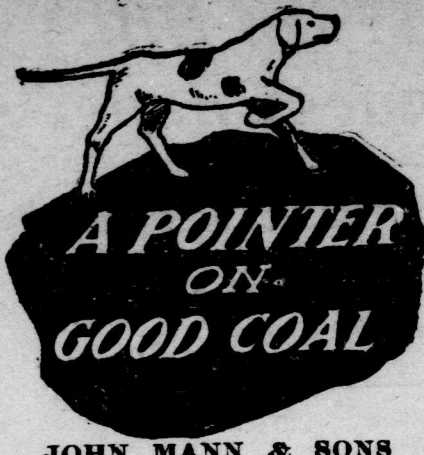

PRESENTED WITH JEWEL

Youngest President of Sons of England Lodge Honored.

Lodge British Oak, No. 82, Sons of England, celebrated its eighteenth anniversary last night in Cullis' Hall, Wellington street, the attendance being very large.

A pleasing programme was rendered, in which Bros. G. Elyatt, C. Elyatt, Parkhouse and George Dickson, took part, rendering solos which were much appreciated. Addresses were also given by Bro. J. Gramlick, who acted as chairman, and Bro. Wilmott.

The feature of the evening was the presentation to Bro. A. Jenkins of a handsome past president's jewel.

PENSIONING HORSES.

One of the most notable of the semi-private humane establishments for the rescue of broken-down horses is known as Red Acre Farm, a charitable home for horses at Stow, Mass. The farm is situated 23 miles from Boston, and consists of 77 acres of land, divided up into pasture land and paddocks, with a portion of it devoted to stable and hospital. Red Acre Farm was founded by a young woman, Miss H. C. Bird, who gave up to the use of the horse the home and grounds which she inherited from her father, and who devoted all her time and strength to the care of the horses. She daily expresses the conditions at the home and has the advice and support of well-known humanitarians.

This farm is kept on the contributions, and the best of management, and having not only to support the horses but also to support the staff, the farm is a great success.

Members of Red Acre Farm, who are not stockholders, can obtain a right to the stable of Red Acre Farm, for \$500, which the donors have been asked to pay.

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CAT IN LOVE WITH DOLL.

Did you ever see a cat in love with a doll? Probably not.

Cats have been known to fall in "love" with chickens, and even hatch eggs and bring up feathered children, but a cat in love with a cold, motionless doll—that is something entirely new.

Yet a Chicago woman, Mrs. John H. Keith, 1380 Sheridan road, has just such a cat.

The cat is one of the male persuasion, and is a handsome Angora, with a big, fluffy tail, a winner of honors at cat shows, and of a color that is best described by his name—Peach.
