

Pittsburg Blanked Trolley Dodgers

TIGERS SCORE TEN IN FOURTH BEATING HIGHLANDERS BY 17 TO 6

Just One Thing Prevented Detroit From Setting the Record for American League—New York Had to Have Another Turn at Bat, Rain Was Threatening.

Detroit, Aug. 28.—Just one thing prevented the Tigers, in the opening game with New York, from setting a new record for Bennett Park, and possibly for the American League, in the matter of run scoring, for a single round.

Ten tallies were taken from the delivery of Jack Chesbro in the fourth inning, and anywhere from two to four more were possibilities.

But with rain threatening and consequent necessity that New York would have another turn at bat to make victory certain, Willett offered himself up as a sacrifice while sticking, and Cobb ran himself to death on the base lines, shortening the slaughter.

They ended the period with ten runs to their credit, thus merely making a tie in the matter of single inning scoring at the local field.

That Fourth Round.
The fourth inning was the feature, section of a 17 to 6 victory by the Tigers—secured while both Athletics and Boston were being put away—that will live in the memory of those who saw it. In this period, fourteen Detroiters batted against Chesbro, who had been sent in to stop the scoring in the previous inning. Seven men hit safely, and four were passed. Cobb and Crawford each came up twice, and each hit for a home run and a single. Prior to this time five runs had been scored off Willett, a left-hander, and subsequently two more were taken from Chesbro.

Willett Might Have Blanked Them.
It is possible that Detroit might have shut out New York had there been extreme anxiety to do this thing, inasmuch as Willett, when he retired, at the end of the sixth, to give Lelivelt a work-out, had been found safely by but one batter. He might as well have quit two innings earlier, but to gratify the ambition that every pitcher has to figure in a no-hit game, was allowed to go along until hopes of this were dispelled. Lelivelt, raw, after a month of idleness, naturally was hit rather hard. Also the fielders were in no way inclined towards the unusual efforts to hold down the figures in a contest that was a foregone conclusion. So the hits and runs off the southern slinger were both somewhat numerous.
