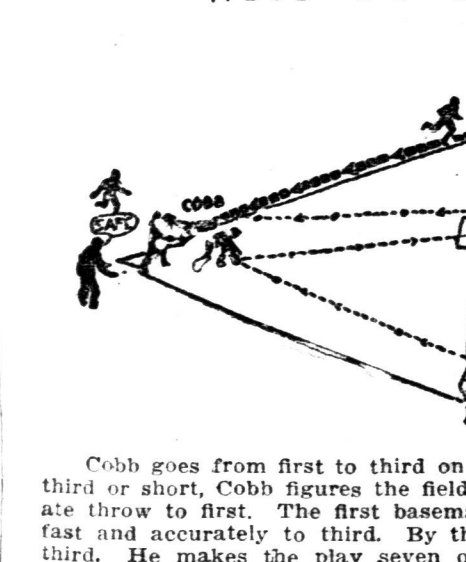

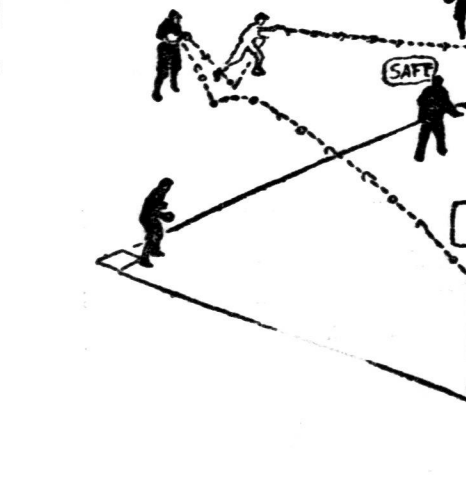
Buffalo Boy, Playing Second for Cincinnati, Makes Auspicious Beginning.

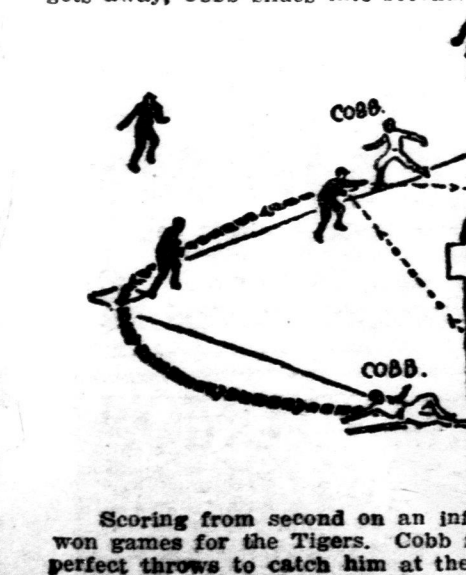

THREE REASONS EXPLAINING  
WHY TIT COBB LEADS ALL

Cobb goes from first to third on an infield out. When the ball is hit to third or short, Cobb figures the fielder will take his time to make an accurate throw to first. The first baseman must make the putout and throw fast and accurately to third. By this time Cobb is usually sliding into third. He makes the play seven out of eight times.



Cobb does not stop at first after hitting the ball. He crosses the sack at top speed and turns toward second. He stops midway. If the infielder gets the ball on a bound, Cobb is ready to slide back to first. If the ball gets away, Cobb slides into second.



Scoring from second on an infield out is another Cobb stunt. It has won games for the Tigers. Cobb figures it requires two, and maybe three, perfect throws to catch him at the plate.

WORLD'S RECORDS  
SET AT SYRACUSETrotting Mark for the Stallions  
Brought Down to 2:01 1/4  
By the Harvester.Pop Geers Goes Out in Front and Is  
Never Headed—Henry Winter  
Fourth.

Syracuse, N.Y., Sept. 15.—The longest racing programme and also the best pulled off on the Grand Circuit this year was raced at the State Fair this afternoon.

No less than four world's records were broken, the most noteworthy being the trotting record for stallions, which The Harvester reduced to 2:01 1/4 in a trip against the watch. It was the greatest of the many great mile trotted by the wonderful horse this season, and for the first time this year he was favored by ideal weather and track conditions.

## CAUSES SENSATIONS.

The race in which three world's records were smashed was the 2:09 trotting stake, carried over from yesterday after the four-year-old Billy Soprano had won two heats and Oro Bellini had won the first. A surprise was sprung in the fourth heat, the first today, when Geers went out in front and never headed, and won the race by a margin of 100 yards. The way from Soprano in 2:06 1/4, a new fourth heat record, the best previous being 2:08 1/4, won by Henry Winter, Bob Douglas and Billy Burke. Demarest won the fifth heat in 2:07 1/4, which also ties the fifth heat record held by Alceste, and the sixth in 2:09, a new sixth heat record, the best previous heat being the 2:09 1/4 of Countess Eva, made in 1897. The race is also the fastest six-heat trotting event ever raced, the best previous being the Pennsylvania stake of 1902 at Lexington, won by Ozanam, 2:07. GENERAL H. LOOKS LIKE A CHAMPION.
