PEOPLE ANXIOUS

FOR ELECTRIC LIGHT

Houses Were Wired Nine Months Ago
in Preparation for the Boom.

A gang of men are putting up poles
along the streets of Chelsea Green and
Belling and the residents of the suburbs
are living in hopes of being users of
power from the city electrical depart-
ment very soon. Several citizens in the
newly-annexed district wired their
homes months ago, trusting that the
lighting advantages would be extended
to them, but they waited in vain.

As pointed out by Chairman Pocock
and Manager Glavin at a meeting in
Chelsea Green three weeks ago, the
homes which were wired would have to
be inspected before connections can be
made with the city system of lighting.
Several streets in Belling have already
poles erected and wires strung, and all
is ready for the installation of the
gloves. These will also have to be in-
spected by electricians before being
used.

Residents of the suburbs are in the
greatest need of street lighting. The
thoroughfares are a complete sea of
darkness at night, and very unsafe
for people walking in the evening. The
people in these districts are therefore
rejoicing when they observe the gang
of men placing poles on the streets.

BROKE ALL RECORDS

Delmer Cheese Factory Has Just Com-
pleted a Splendid Year.

WEST LONDONERS

WANT NEW STAIRS

Those Leading to Blackfriars Bridge
Are in Dangerous Condition.

A petition requesting the city coun-
cil to take up the matter of securing
a new flight of steps at the foot of
Central avenue, leading to Blackfriars
bridge, in West London, was presented
to the West London Improvement So-
ciety on Wednesday evening, asking
that the association discuss it in their
meeting and secure signatures.

It was pointed out that the present
steps are practically worn out, and
that their day of usefulness is over.
The broken condition of the stairs
might easily cause an accident and
leave the city liable to a suit for heavy
damages. On behalf of the society,
President J. J. Clark signed the peti-
tion.

TELEGRAPH FIGURES

Over Ten Million Messages Were Sent
Out During 1912.

Ottawa, Feb. 5.—Telegraph com-
panies in Canada, according to the
annual report thereon by the Railways
and Canals Department transmitted
10,021,099 messages, approximating
about 200,000,000 words during 1912.

Foreign companies do a big share of
the business in Canada, the Western
Union, for instance, earning \$354,833
from Canadian business in the twelve
months. Of the six cable companies
having a terminus in Canada all are
more or less under foreign control.
The cost of real property and equip-
ment of the telegraph companies was
\$184,149,677. A total of 168,017 miles
of lines were operated, of which 254
miles were under ground and 689
miles submarine.

SECRETARY WILLIAMS

LEAVES STREET RAILWAY

Successor Will Not Be Named

for Some Time—Annual

Meeting of Company.

At the annual meeting of the London
street railway, which was held yester-
day afternoon, Mr. John W. Williams,
who has been secretary-treasurer of
the company for the past year and a
half, resigned. Mr. Williams gave as
the reason for his action the condition
of his wife's health, which has been
far from favorable since the removal
of the family from Detroit to this city
when Mr. Williams accepted the position
left vacant by the death of Mr.
George E. Benson.

Mr. King, the manager of the com-
pany, when asked as to the probable
successor of Mr. Williams, stated that
as yet no action had been taken to
secure a capable man, but that the
appointment would be made as soon
as possible. Mr. Williams will con-
tinue in his present capacity until the
appointment is made.

A Successful Year.

The business year ending which
was of a routine nature only, included
the reading of the annual financial
statement. The report showed that
1912 had been the most successful in
the history of the company. During
the year the company carried 3,353,230
passengers, and the gross earnings
totalled \$306,231.02. The operating
expenses were \$210,278.13.

In 1911 the company carried 3,000,000
passengers, and the gross earnings
totalled \$279,606.93, and the operating ex-
penses \$192,736.76.

All the directors with the exception
of Mr. Hole of Montreal, were present,
and the same officers were re-elected
as follows: H. A. Everett, president;
T. H. Smallman, vice-president; P. W.
D. Eschler, W. M. Spence, J. B.
Moore and C. H. Ivey, directors, and
C. B. King, general manager.

don, and Rev. Dr. McCrae, of West-
chester, the service was closed. Then
Dr. McCrae took the floor, and invit-
ing the people of the congregation out-
side, as well as some forty or fifty
guests from Rev. J. Smith's former
pastorate, Hamilton Road Church, who
had also come down for the occasion,
he led in presenting Rev. J. Smith
the following gifts: A horse,
buggy and outfit, and a fine new
robe, a silk hat and a black cloth
overcoat and a fine fur overcoat.

Smith replied to the following address:

BOARD TO DECIDE

Will Settle Issue Between the Grand
Trunk and Dominion Express.

Ottawa, Feb. 5.—The reference to the
Minister of Railways of the issue
between the Grand Trunk and Do-
minion Express Company in regard
to the refusal of the former company
to allow the express company to con-
tinue doing business in Bonaventure
station, Montreal, will probably be
immediately turned over to the rail-
way commission for prompt action.
Hon. Frank Cochrane said this after-
noon that the matter was one which
must be settled at once, in view of
the serious interruption of business
in forwarding express matter at
Montreal over the Grand Trunk and
Intercolonial lines.

The question was one which right-
ly came under the jurisdiction of the
railway commission, which has su-
pervision over both railway and ex-
press companies. Mr. Cochrane had
no official statement to make on the
question today, but it is probable that
he will not personally interfere. The
advice of the legal officers of the de-
partment and the railway commis-
sion is being sought first.

Indications are that a temporary
order will be made by the commis-
sion directing the Grand Trunk to
continue to allow the Dominion Ex-
press to use the station.
