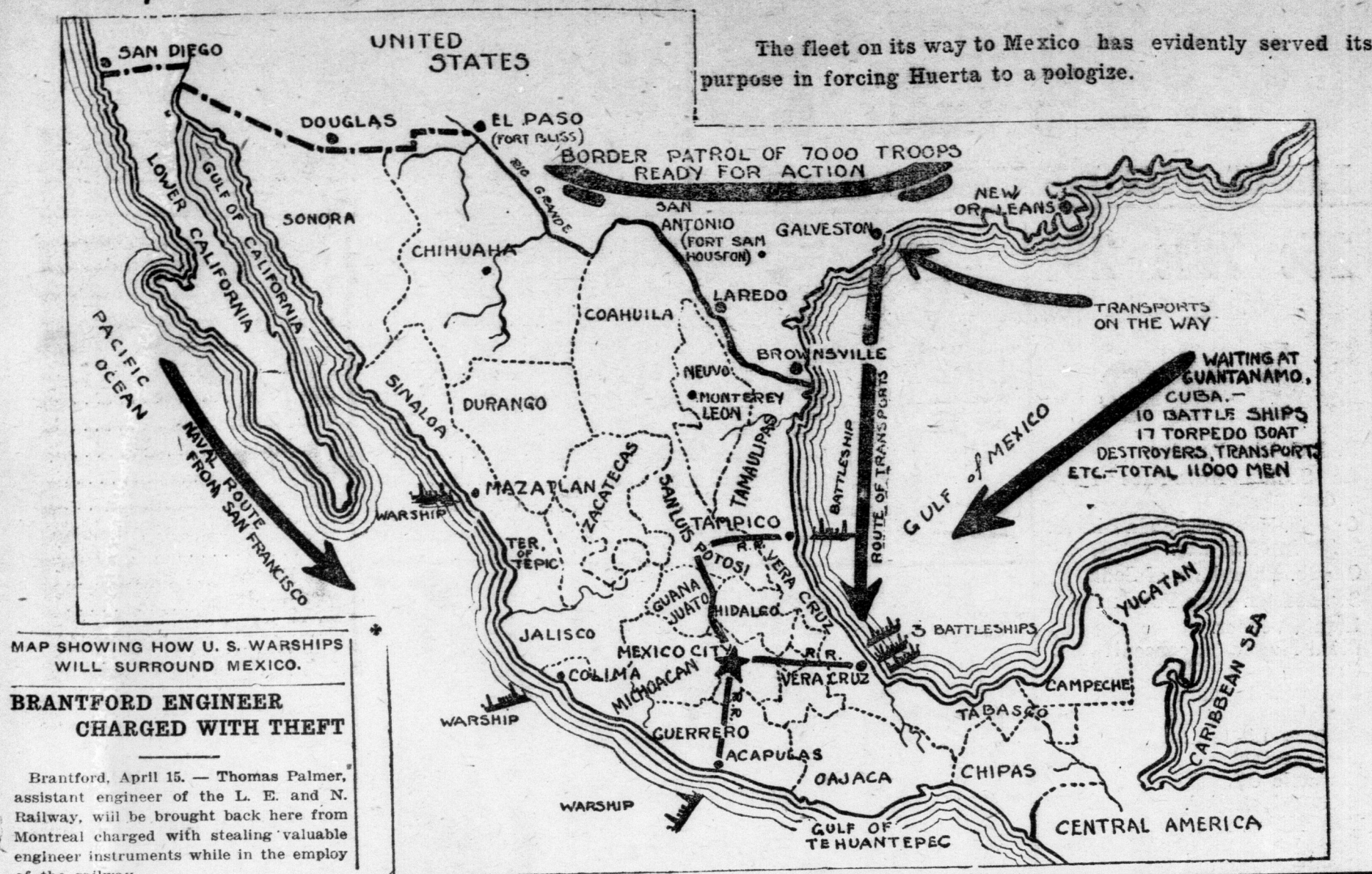


Map Showing How U.S. Warships Will Surround Mexico

London Papers Blame Wilson For Present Situation

[Canadian Press.] London, April 16.—Most London morning papers, in their editorial comment on the Mexican situation, display sympathy with President Wilson in the difficulties which have arisen with Mexico, while at the same time contending that those difficulties were largely brought about by his idealistic policy. Much curiosity is expressed over the intentions of the United States because, although it is generally believed Huerta will yield, it is pointed out that should he remain obdurate the mere occupation of Tampico would not have much practical effect, and that the blockade of Vera Cruz would be the only measure that would deal a serious blow to the Huerta regime. The Daily Telegraph cannot believe that President Wilson intends to put into effect a resolute military intervention and sees no hope of putting an end "to the anarchy which has resulted from the Wilson policy of moral intervention."

Eight Lives Lost When Ship Sinks

Schooner Charles K. Buckley Goes Ashore on New Jersey Coast—Captain and Wife Drown—Only One Saved.

[Canadian Press.] New York, April 16.—The identity of the schooner which went ashore in a northeast gale near Long Branch, N.J., last night, was established by life savers at daybreak today as the Charles K. Buckley, from Jacksonville, Fla., for New York. The schooner is a total loss and Captain Hardy, his wife, and all members of the crew, except one seaman, named Atchison, were lost while attempting to launch a lifeboat. Atchison, who remained on deck, was rescued soon after midnight by being virtually lassoed by a line shot across the bow of the schooner from the shore. Atchison got twisted up in the breeches buoy line and was dragged from the deck into the seething sea. Life savers on shore then ran into the water, dragging Atchison upon the beach more dead than alive. He was

The Chronicle argues that any sovereign state might, without loss of dignity have condoned the Tampico affront on receipt of the apology which Huerta has already tendered, and says: "It is therefore difficult to disconnect the President's action entirely from the return of Mr. Lind. It is evident that Mr. Lind went home to urge stronger measures, and stronger measures have followed forthwith. They need not involve war. The Americans need only to sit tight at Tampico and Vera Cruz and collect the customs. In short, it is one further step in the policy begun a year ago of forcing Huerta to abdicate by cutting off his financial supplies. The drawback of every step forward, however, is that it makes it more difficult for President Wilson ever to go back." The Daily News is of the opinion that it will need all of President Wilson's firmness and patience to save the United States from slipping into a perilous path and marching on Mexico City should the occupation of Vera Cruz not bring Huerta to reason.

KONG, CHINESE BOY, WILL DENY MURDER

Alleged to Have Killed Vancouver Woman, Trial Begins Today.

[Canadian Press.] Vancouver, B. C., April 16.—Jack Kong, the Chinaman accused of the murder of Mrs. Millard, will be brought up for trial this morning. Kong, according to the police, maintains a stolid and sulky demeanor, which is in strong contrast with his former disposition, when he occupied the time in whistling, popular airs. According to a statement made by the chief of police, Kong will absolutely deny the crime for which he is being held. He now contradicts the story that he told to the husband of the murdered woman and Crown Prosecutor Kennedy.

LORD CROMER WOULD LET MILITANTS DIE

Takes Another Fling at Them at Society "At Home."

[Canadian Press.] New York, April 16.—A cable to the New York American from London says: Lord Cromer, "the great mogul of Egypt," has been having another fling at the militants. He was in the van of the hostile forces at Lady Haversham's anti-suffrage "at home" at her house in Grosvenor street last night, and made one of his scorching speeches. The speech of Lord Cromer was punctuated with applause, especially when he said that he could not imagine anyone giving in to the militants now. He was further in accord with those who held that if a woman in prison refused to take her food she should be allowed to commit suicide.

"This wretched sex war," proceeded his lordship, "is making men less courteous to women, and women more aggressive to men." Burn Londonderry House. Londonderry, Ireland, April 16.—Militant suffragettes made their first onslaught on this city today, when an "arson squad" set fire to and burned to the ground a large residence. A paper bearing the words "fair play for women. Apply for damages to Sir Edward Carson. Stop the torture of women," was found on the premises.

UNKNOWN BOAT ASHORE

Rough Seas Prevent Aid From Reaching Her.

Seabright, N. J., April 15.—In the heavy gale which blew along the coast tonight an unidentified three-masted schooner struck near here and was carried a mile down the coast to Galilee, where she stuck fast, flashing signals of distress and exploding rockets. West End, North Long Branch and Monmouth Beach stations sent life-saving crews. Tremendous combers and a 70-mile-an-hour wind, however, made it too perilous for boats to be sent out. A breeches buoy was rigged, out and after many futile attempts the life-savers succeeded in getting a line across the schooner's bow.

At a late hour this identity of the vessel and the number of persons on board had not been learned. The rescuers were planning to send one of their number in the breeches buoy out to the ship.

CZAR'S SON WELL AGAIN

[Canadian Press.] New York, April 16.—A cable from St. Petersburg to the New York American says: It is reported on good authority that the Czar's little son has now fully recovered his health. He has lost the pailor he had when the court went south to Livadia last fall, and now has a fresh, healthy appearance. His physical movements are free, and there is no trace of the former stiffness in the left leg.

VESSEL IN DISTRESS

Revenue Cutter Sent to Assist Ship Off Cape Porpoise.

[Canadian Press.] Kennebunkport, Me., April 15.—A vessel, said to be a steamer or large schooner, was reported in distress off Cape Porpoise today. Rockets were sent up from a point not far from shore. It was snowing hard, and a northeast wind held strong. The revenue cutter Woodbury, at Portland, was notified, and started at once to render assistance.

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AN INTERNATIONAL ANTARCTIC EXPEDITION

One Projected to Start in 1915, England and Sweden Taking Part.
