

NEW SHIP CONSTRUCTED
ENTIRELY OF CONCRETEFirst Stone Vessel Ever Floated Looks
Like a Barge.

CHRISTIANIA, Sept. 13.—Via London, 1:45 a.m.—A new type of ship has arrived here from the shipyards of Christiania, Norway. The ship, which resembles a huge barge, is constructed

entirely of concrete, except for the ribs, which are steel, and is the first stone vessel ever floated. It is said that the hull will resist damage better than steel or wood, and that the ship is therefore safer.

VICTIM OF NERVY
ROBBERY AT BORDER

One of Seven Passengers
Mulcted of Money.

BY "FAKE" CUSTOMS MAN

Given Receipts for Parts of
Wads Taken as
"Deposits."

BUFFALO, Sept. 12.—Seven passengers on a C. P. R. train from Toronto were victims of an unusual robbery as the train crossed into the United States today. The train had been stopped for the customs inspector when a man walked into one of the coaches and began questioning the passengers. Of Mrs. Jessie M. Ardill of New York city he demanded: "How much money have you got?"

Mrs. Ardill opened her purse and the man counted \$110. He returned \$85 to the woman, saying he would have to keep the remainder as a "deposit." He wrote a receipt for the money as "paid over to the United States customs at Buffalo."

In like fashion the man got \$83 from Edward Crockett of Brantford, Ont. Five others in the car also gave up money, but their names were not obtained by the police.

The robbery was not discovered until the train pulled into the Buffalo station, when Mrs. Ardill asked the conductor what she should do with her receipt. The passengers gave a good description of the man, who they had supposed was a customs official.

GARNISHEE WAGES
OF STRIKING FOREIGNERS

Ingersoll's Chief Takes This Way of
Getting Poll Tax.

INGERSOLL, Sept. 12.—Action was taken by Chief of Police Rutherford today which put the quietus on a number of the striking foreigners, who were brought here by the contractors to do permanent street work. The men had made no move towards resuming work after going on strike on Saturday.

The matter of collecting poll tax from them, which had been taken up before, brought forth a quick decision on the part of the chief of police. This he did by means of a garnishee in each case, and collected the sum of \$5.90 from each one of them. They were then told to get out of the town, which they did, taking all their belongings with them.

HUNGARY INDIGNANT
OVER FAILURE TO
PROTECT FRONTIER

Budapest Correspondent Says
Railwaymen and Peasants
Were Forces Available.

LONDON, Sept. 13.—According to the Morning Post's Budapest correspondent there is intense indignation in Hungary over the failure of the Government to make provisions against a Rumanian advance immediately after the declaration of war.

"The Rumanians reached important points on the frontiers, and within the frontiers, before the people realized what was happening," says the correspondent. "The defence along the frontier was undertaken by gendarmes, railwaymen and peasants, owing to the absence of Hungarian soldiers."

"It is stated that the defence of Transylvania was originally allotted to Gen. Edlanzer-Ballin, but the latter had been given another command, and since then nothing has been done—the authorities simply trusted to luck in the hope that Rumania would not, after all, abandon her neutrality."
