Is Now Featherweight Champ of World, Says Commish.

NEW YORK Aug. 15.—Johnny Dun-dee of New York knocked out Danny Frush in the ninth round of a scheduled 15-round bout tonight at Ebbets Field. 15-round bout tonight at Ebbets Field. Frush had taken a count of nine in the eighth round.

The New York Italian led after a cautious first round. He jabbed away with a straight left to the head, mixing in hard body punches and bouncing away before Frush could counter.

In the early rounds the Clevelander landed severe lefts that joited Dundee and several times Dundee held on.

The way to a knockout was paved in the seventh, when Dundee changed his style and fooled Frush into rushing into the lead.
