





LETTER TO MAYOR

Commission Regulates Size of

Attorney-General Sends Ruling Which May Help To Solve the Police Problem.

Members of the city council are empowered to reduce police commission estimates to any extent they feel impelled, according to written opinion available today from Attorney General W. E. Raney.

The official communication at hand this marning from the Toronte outlet. this morning from the Toronto authorities to Mayor Wenige is the result of his worship's appeal to the attorney-general a week ago, for a ruling in this matter. The mayor announced following the defeat of the "McBride elective police commission" bill that he was "not through."

Members of the council, principally Ald. Colbert and Drake have already voiced the opinion that if the council

voiced the opinion that if the counci general designates, it would serve their purpose even as much as an elective form of police administration. They stressed their contention that they had no desire to interfere with the actual dispensation of justice in the stresses. tice in the statutes.

The Ruling. The ruling to Mayor Wenige from Toronto is as follows:
"The estimates submitted by the board of police commissioners to the council under section 363 of the Municipal Act are undoubtedly, in our opinion, subject to reduction."

"Formerly under this section, be-fore the amendment in 1920, the board submitted estimates to the counci and the council held no right to inter-fere with the same. It is quite clear now, however, from the wording of this section, that this is no longer the case and that the estimates are like other estimates, subject to what is known as 'pruning'." "Under section 359, the police force

in cities (and in towns having a po-lice commission) shall consist of a chief constable and other officers and assistants as the council may deem necessary, but not less than the board reports is absolutely required.

Council Can Cut. "In our opinion this does not affect the power of the council to reduce the estimates of the board of police commissioners, but merely enacts that the number of constables in cities must not be less than the board reports is absolutely required.
