Thoburn and Dr. Preston, M.P.P., will respectively be the federal and provincial nominees for the riding of North Lanark.

READY FOR SIGNATURES

The Anglo-American Arbitration Treaty Is in Its Last Stage.

Only the Formalities of Amending Some Items of Phraseology Now Remain and Pact Should Be Completed Within a Few Hours—Permanent Court of Arbitration Is Indicated in Terms of the Treaty.

Washington, June 30.—All formalities necessary to the final conclusion of the general arbitration treaty between America and Great Britain could be completed within four hours, assuming that the machinery was working properly and smoothly, was the official declaration yesterday. The differences between the two countries now relate merely to phraseology and can be readily adjusted. The British ambassador has full powers to sign the treaty and the administration so far has failed to find any signs of objection to the compact on the part of the Senate.

It is distinctly stated that, notwithstanding impressions to the contrary, the treaty conserves to the utmost the constitutional powers of the Senate in treaty making, and that every question to be submitted to arbitration must first receive the approval of the Senate. But it is pointed out that the very negotiation of the treaty will almost have the effect of lessening the number of issues to be arbitrated. This is explained by the fact that through the creation of a commission

of inquiry, composed of eminent members of the Hague tribunal, most of the issues that may arise between the two Governments can be settled satisfactorily by the adoption of the findings of that commission and without the necessity of proceeding to arbitration.

Unofficial advisers indicate the French Government is practically ready to enter into treaty with the United States on the basis of Secretary Knox's terms, and action may soon be had in that direction. The French ambassador being on his way here.

Nothing definite has been heard from Germany since the Knox proposal was handed to Ambassador Bernstorff upon his application. Holland also has been furnished with a copy of the projected treaty, and other nations are showing marked interest in the subject.

An interesting feature of the projected treaty is the provision for the reference of issues to a tribunal. This is so framed as to forecast the creation of the permanent court of arbitration, towards which the administration is steadily working.

Too Drastic Measure.

Montreal, June 30.—The Provincial Board of Health has ordered the Intercolonial Railway to discontinue all service to Lac-Au-Saumon, in the County of Marston. The move was made by the officials of the board after a severe outbreak of smallpox in Lac-Au-Saumon, the local authorities notifying the board that they were unable to cope with the situation, owing to the resistance of the population.
