RELIGIOUS RIOTS.

The Island of Lewis the Scene Serious Conflicts.

London, Dec. 30. — The Island of Lewis (northermost and largest island of the outer Hebrides) has been the scene of serious religious riots, arising from the union of the Free and the United Churches of Scotland. The islanders refused to countenance the alliance, and when the minister at Ness joined the United Church they locked him 'out of his church. A strong force of police was sent over from the mainland to open the doors whereupon the islanders congregated and throwing volleys of stones at the constables, drove them inside the building and bombarded them with rocks until they capitulated and agreed to leave the island. Every member of the police force was more or less seriously wounded. It is probable that a detachment of troops be sent to subdue the rioters.

THE ZIONIST CONGRESS.

Resolves to Establish a Branch Bank in Palestine.
