GREAT HOPE FOR ATLIN.

Though Some Early Prospectors There Have Been Very Easily Discouraged-The First Building.

Atlin, April 27 .- A lot has been said about Atlin and its prospects by many prominent men of the place. It has been boomed more or less, and very justly, too. It is as yet, practically speaking, a country that there is very little known about it; a place where but little true prospecting has been done-prospecting as it is done in other large camps of the world. It is a place where men have congregated who are not miners. TRADE

men have congregated who are not miners, who put down small holes of two or three feet and call it a prospect hole; and if a little scepage water comes in they give up in despair and run the country down. These men go outside to the coa.t and the cities and say that the country is no good. Speaking of the country honestly, it is a country of great resources, great possibili-ties. True, it is only a mining country, but it has placer ground which gives every indication of being rich—not as rich as Daw-son, but rich, and distributed over an immense area. Then, too, there is an abundance of quartz, free-milling and base. Some free-milling ore has averaged \$00 per ton. This was found recently about eight miles from Aths. The Otter lake district promises to show up well from specimens, some of which were brought a by Mr. Norman Smith a few weeks ago, looking rich in free gold. As for the little town of Atiln, it is growing steadily, and several very nice buildings are nearing completion.
