GREEKS PLAN UPRIS

Threaten to Cause Trouble In
Unless Given Their Way
In Crete

Berlin, April 6.—A correspondent of the Cologne Gazette, writing from Salonica, says that it is an opinion that should the Cretan problem be settled to their satisfaction the Greeks intend to organize a large Epirus, preparations for which are already being made. It is also stated that the Greeks are well supplied with money for this purpose.

Although the determined attitude manifested of late by the Government has somewhat reduced the ardor of the Greeks, it was imprudent on the part of the Government not to prepare for all possible circumstances. It deserves no credit that the Turks are very much inclined to believe that the idea of
