Students Escape in Safety But  
Lost all Their Belongings.  
Loss About \$150,000

Bathurst, N. B., March 6.—The Seminary of the Sacred Heart, situated in West Bathurst, was completely destroyed by fire about three o'clock this morning.

Ever since the destruction of the college at Caraquet in January 1916, the Seminary was used by the Edul Fathers as a College, and at the time of the fire had 150 students on the roll. The structure was a magnificent one, being of stone and brick, 170 feet long by 70 wide, costing over \$100,000.

The fire broke out on the first floor and when discovered had made considerable headway. The students all safely made their escape, but lost all their belongings. Very little help could be given the Fathers, owing to the storm, which was the most severe experienced here in twenty years. There is about \$40,000 insurance. There is about \$0,000 insurance.

Owing to inconvenience in train New Carlisle, thus reaching the grief-stricken mother seven hours earlier than would have otherwise been possible.

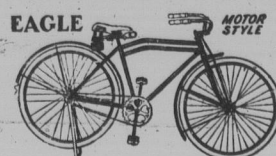
The funeral was held in St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church on Sunday, March 4th. The attendance was unusually large, there being ninety-three (93) horses.

#### MUST ANCHOR

OUTSIDE HARBOR

German Merchant Ships Ordered to  
Leave Honolulu

Honolulu, March 6.—German merchant steamers taking refuge in this port were under orders of the harbor commission here to-day to leave their piers and anchor outside the harbor. It was said the order was issued to guard against possible damage to the vessels, if they continued to lie at the piers. As the machinery on each of the steamers has been disabled, they will be towed to their anchorages. In the event of a southerly storm, they will be in a dangerous position, and in their disabled condition, it is said, they are likely to be lost.

London, March 6.—The situation among the poorer classes in Austria is extremely serious, according to comments in the Austrian newspapers on Premier Clam-Martino's announcement that the government has appropriated millions of kronen for the purchase of food for the destitute. A Rotterdam despatch to the Exchange Telegraph Company, says that the Austrian press declares that poverty is so great that the gravest events are expected unless immediate help is given.

#### LONDON PAPER HITS BORDEN GOVERNMENT

"The Nation" Talks About Men  
Flocking to King's  
Evidence.

The Nation, a weekly review, which although not over-popular just now on account of its pacific leanings, is generally considered to be a soundly conducted journal, gave prominence yesterday to a long letter, signed Hespericus, on the Liberal revival in Canada. "The Borden Government has scantiest hope of re-election," says the writer. Already the thames, who in Canada take the form of contractors, are flying and turning King's evidence in graft cases against ex-Ministers; financial manœuvres are being conducted with the administrative incompetency everywhere visible; Sir Sam Hughes has been bundled out by his exasperated colleagues, and there are others who must soon follow.

"Premier Borden is the least inspiring of statesmen, if the most virtuous. He is also the dullest of his Cabinet, and a new country like variety even in its politics. If the Laurier Government was corrupt, it amused the people, and did things. Borden's Government is more corrupt, and disgusts men with its dull, incompetent lethargy. It is to-day perishing of a complication of diseases."

Amongst these the writer cites the irreparable loss in the death of Hon. Mr. Casgrain, the resignation of the Chief Whip (another Minister deeply involved in a graft inquiry), Hughes plotting revengeful disclosures, and a group of financial magnates openly working for a business Government. "Yet it has come about that the head of his discredited Administration crosses the Atlantic in February to sit at a council board as a tame cat of Lord Milner," says the writer. "If he were wise, he would not attempt to pose as a representative leader of Canadian people until he has obtained their verdict at the polls. He may return in all possibility to meet the same reception as that other Imperialist idol, Hughes, of Australia."

**BRITISH ATTACK GERMAN LINES**  
Violent Artillery Action East of Bouchavesmes

Berlin, March 6.—Via Sayville.—The German lines east of Bouchavesmes north of Peronne, on the Somme front, were attacked last night by the British after violent artillery preparations, the army headquarters announced to-day. The text of the statement reads:—

"Western front: On the right bank of the Somme the artillery duel increased to great violence towards evening. After drum fire, the British attacked again east of Bouchavesmes. The attack was repulsed. A further attack was frustrated due to our annihilating fire.

"In the other sectors of the front the firing activity was the most part of a limited nature, during the blizzard that prevailed. Reconnoitering parties, which reached the line off French positions in Cauriers Wood, opposite the lines gained there by us, brought in 15 prisoners."
