Council for Grimmer be authorized to
spend a sum not to exceed \$200 in
repairing lockup at St. Quentin.—
Carried.The Secretary read a letter from
Mrs. Mott asking for a raise of \$300.00
in salary provided the office produces
the revenue to pay same.A committee composed of Couns.
Shannon, Murchie and Miller was ap-
pointed to look into Recording Office
matters.The account of Fred Furlotte \$3.00
was reconsidered and after discussion
disallowed as it had been recommend-
ed by the Public Lands and Building
Committee.The Warden appointed Couns.
Doyle, Barberie, Shannon and Dickie
on the Assessment Committee.The committee on Assessment was
instructed to retire and prepare the
assessment.It was decided that the Councillors
and County officers attend the funeral
of the late Daniel McDonald in a body.
The council adjourned until 2.30 p.m.
Friday afternoon.The council reassembled at 2 o'clock.
The minutes of the previous session
were read and approved.The Secretary was on motion author-
ized to have a telephone installed in
his office.The annual grant of \$1500 was made

Secretary LeBlanc hereby report as
follows:—The charges are three in number in
which the Secretary is accused of neg-
lect of duty.The first charge is:—"From April
15th to May 29th, 1920, for 44 days,
although repeatedly asked he refused
to issue a cheque to the secretary of
the Board of Health for the money
Council in January. Dr. Ferguson
voted for Health purposes from your

of Mr. LeBlanc throughout the whole
transaction was commendable and in
the best interests of the County, and
we repeat that the charges were false.As to the issuing of Mr. LeBlanc's
salary every month the County re-
cords show that the Council has ap-
proved of the Secretary being paid
monthly since 1914, and that disposes
of the last part of the charge which
is also false.The second charge is as follows:—
Dr. Ferguson's own words, "According
to the Government law officers it is
the secretary's duty to supply the
Sheriff with copies of the voter's lists;
he refused to do this unless the sheriff
paid him."After hearing Sheriff Craig and Mr.
LeBlanc in reference to this charge,
we find that Mr. LeBlanc is not to sup-
ply the sheriff with copies of voters'
lists unless the sheriff pays him for
them and we believe Mr. LeBlanc's
statement that he acted on the advice
of the Legal Adviser of the County,
the Honourable Provincial Secretary
and the Attorney General.We therefore find that this second
charge is false.The third charge is that the Secretary
"attempted to interfere with and
prevent the Town Police from
prosecuting certain men alleged to be
guilty of serious offences: All re-
spectable men will agree with the
police that the Sheriff should not
interfere with his official position if he
assisted instead of interfering with him
and if he did so again he would put him
in jail." In connection with this charge
Dr. Ferguson stated that it was to
police that he referred.Brown being examined by us said pos-
itively that this charge was not true;
that Secretary LeBlanc did not inter-
fere or attempt to prevent him from
prosecuting anybody, nor did he
Brown, ever say to LeBlanc the
words Dr. Ferguson states he did. We

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matter lay over until the July session
and that the Public Lands and Build-
ing Committee and the Auditor look
into the matter in the meantime and
report at that session.—Carried.Coun. Gillis moved that the Auditor
be granted an increase of \$100.00 per
year.—Carried.The Premier's letter in reference to
increased cost of maintenance of pa-
per patients at Prov. Hospital was
taken up.Moved by Coun. Shannon, that
whereas the Prov. Hosp. is a Provin-
cial institution and whereas the said
Institution has been kept in the past
from Provincial revenues together
with the maximum charge of \$1.00
per week for each inmate and although
this Municipality realizes that there
has been a certain increase in the
upkeep of said institution, we also re-
alize that the same revenues which have
rendered the necessary increase in co-
st of upkeep have also increased the
revenues of the province in far greater
proportion.Be it therefore resolved that this
municipality does not entertain the
request of the Provincial government
through the Premier, the Hon. W. E.
Foster and furthermore that we
strongly protest against any increase
in view of the decrease in the cost of
all materials and that a copy of this
resolution be forwarded to the Sec-
retary of the Premier.Coun. Duncan spoke strongly again-
st the motion. He thought that we
were paying a very low rate for such
patients. However he said that he
did not agree to paying the increase
until the bill was passed and in force.Coun. Dickie said that he did not
favor the increase. We had just cut
the price allowed for prisoners board
to 50 cents per day, and why should
we stand for this increase. He thought
if all the municipalities were to warn
the premier it might have good results.Coun. Shannon thought the passing
of the resolution might have a good
effect.

The motion was carried.

The council adjourned until 2 o'clock.
Saturday Afternoon.The council reassembled at 2 o'clock
pursuant to adjournment.The minutes of the previous session
were read and approved.Mr. W. H. Wallace was again given
permission to address the council. He
spoke of the needs of a Municipal home
for our poor and also that he would
like to have his name placed in nomi-
nation as a valuator.Coun. Duncan moved that a valua-
tion of the county be taken this
