

TORONTO'S FOUR DAYS RACING

THE PROGRAM FOR THE O. J. C. MEETING IN MAY

A Program of 23 Events—Opening of the Season—Washington Selected as the Place for the National Regatta—Business for the Wheelmen's Meeting—General Sporting News

The complete program for the Ontario Jockey Club's four-day meeting at Woodbine Park may now be made out and comprises a list of 23 events—six each day except May 27, when five races will be run.

The conditions and entries of three of these were announced on Feb. 1. Entries for the Carriage Handicap, Hesperus Handicap, Stakes, Royal Canadian Handicap and Dominion Handicap close May 1; for the Trial, Purse, Woodbine Steeplechase, Toronto Cup, Free Walker Handicap, Hurler Race, Club House Purse, the Hesperus Handicap, the Hesperus Chase, Don Purse, the Ladies' Purse, Stirling Stakes, on May 2; the Licensed Victuallers' Plate, Hurler Race, Steeplechase Handicap, on May 3; the Constellation Staking Race, on May 4; and an open race on the afternoon of the last day.

The program is a grand one and should ensure Canadian patronage of the racing factory sport for these four days in May.

FRIDAY—SATURDAY, MAY 23. The Trial Purse, 2.30 p.m., of \$300. For all ages, weight for age; maidens allowed 5 lbs. 1000 to 1200 to carry 115 lbs. 14 miles to close May 23.

Winners of steeplechase or hurdle race in 1890 or 1891, netting \$200 to \$300, may enter for two of which, or one of \$500, 5 lbs. horses that have won a second or third place in hurdle races allowed 5 lbs., half-breds allowed 5 lbs., about 1000 to 1200 to carry 115 lbs. 14 miles to close May 23.

Toronto Cup, 4 p.m., worth \$1000. For 2-year-olds and upwards, of which \$700 to second and \$300 to third; a sweepstakes of \$100 to be run on the same day. Winners of any race in the year 1890 or 1891, netting \$200 to \$300, may enter for two of which, or one of \$500, 5 lbs. horses that have won a second or third place in hurdle races allowed 5 lbs., half-breds allowed 5 lbs., about 1000 to 1200 to carry 115 lbs. 14 miles to close May 23.

Free Walker Handicap, 4.30 p.m., of \$300. For 3-year-olds and upwards, of which \$200 to second and \$100 to third; a sweepstakes of \$100 to be run on the same day. THE O. J. C. ANNUAL.

Important Business to be Transacted at the Meeting Here on Friday.

The annual meeting of the Canadian Wheelmen's Association will be held in the city to-morrow. Including the business before the meeting will be the disposal of the annual report for 1891; the advisability of reducing the annual fee from 50 to 40 cents per year; the formation of some scheme to reach the Minister of Customs, looking to the modification of the present regulations in force as to the entry into the country of wheels in use; a proposal to issue a new guide book.

Also the association will consider several proposed amendments to the by-laws, as follows: To admit of a person being elected to clubs affiliated with the association without the necessity of his being a member in annual meet; To amend article 8, clause 1, to provide that club proxies at the annual meeting shall only be held by members of said club; To amend article 4, clause 1, so far as it relates to the election of members and representatives; by providing that their election shall take place in the annual general meeting; To amend article 10, clause 1, in order to provide for classification of pneumatic and cushion-tired wheels used in racing.
