QUEEN'S BIRTHDAY HONORS.

CHIEF JUSTICE STRONG AND SENATOR CARLING KNIGHTED.

Hon. John Carling, knight of the Order of St. Michael and St. George—An unusual number of British honors were conferred on the recipients of honors at the hands of Her Majesty.

LONDON, June 2.—The usual list of titles bestowed on fortunate commoners in honor of Her Majesty's Birthday shows that a phenomenal proportion has fallen to gentlemen connected with the press.

W. J. Ingram, Liberal M.P. for Boston, and chief secretary of the former order of the Illustrated London news, is created a baronet, and John Long, editor and managing proprietor of The Dundee Advertiser, also Liberal M.P. for Dundee, is created a baronet.

Dr. Charles Cameron, M.P. for Glasgow, owner of The Glasgow Mail, is made a baronet. Sir Huxley Vivian, Liberal member for Swanscombe, is raised to a peerage. He is not connected with the press.

Senator Carling of Canada has been made a knight of the Grand Cross of St. Michael and St. George.

Chief Justice Strong of Canada was also knighted.

ABERDEEN ESCUEWS POLITICS.

He Will Not Participate in the Lords' Debate on Home Rule.

LONDON, June 2.—The question having arisen as to whether or not the Earl of Aberdeen would take part in the Home Rule debate in the Imperial House of Lords, His Lordship has made a statement in this connection.

The Earl of Aberdeen denies that he will take any part whatever in the expected debate in the Upper House. He further declares that since receiving the appointment of Governor-General of the Dominion of Canada, he has taken no share in party politics.

Imperative political business, he further states, will keep him in England three months longer. At the expiration of this period he will sail for Canada.

The Earl of Aberdeen said the Countess Catharine, his wife, is kindly waiting for him, through the Canadian press, otherwise, he has been extended.

SIR ADOLPHE NOT TO RETIRE.

LONDON, June 2.—Sir Adolphe Caron, the Canadian Postmaster-General, left here for Paris to-day. At the expiration of his term of office he is expected to retire from the post.

Canadian Princess Quarrel on Route to Paris.

ST. PETERSBURG, June 2.—Prince Barnam and Prince Minatopha, members of the leading families of the Dominion of Canada, started to-day for Moscow in order to solicit the permission of the Czar to enter the Imperial Guard.

While on the journey they quarreled and fought a duel, Prince Barnam being fatally shot and Prince Minatopha being wounded.

Both were taken to the hospital at Moscow, Hungary, placed a dynamite bomb in a railway coach to-day. The bomb exploded killing one person and dangerously injuring two others.

SEALS NOT DOMESTIC ANIMALS.

Sir Richard Webster Continues His Address and Pokes Fun at Some of Mr. Carling's Theories.

PARIS, June 2.—The Behring Sea Court of Arbitration this morning heard the continuation of Sir Richard Webster's argument. Sir Richard explained that special authority was claimed for the straits territorial owners in the case of the Straits of St. Juan de Fuca, the Norway fjords, and the Behring Sea.

These privileges were claimed only by the private owners of land.

Baron de Courcel expressed his deep opinion against the claim that, authority before a marine league was untenable except in the case of acquiescent nations.

Sir Richard Webster denied this assertion. The seal fisheries were an important factor when the seals were purchased. But it was fallacious to claim that the animals were private property.

Hearing sea. [Amateur Report.] PARIS, June 2.—Richard Webster continued his argument to-day before the Behring Sea Tribunal of Arbitration in the case of the seals.

He argued that the seals were not domestic animals, and that there was no property in the seals until they were killed or captured.

THE AGREEMENT WITH RUSSIA.

As To the Protection of Russia's Sealing Interests in Behring Sea.

LONDON, June 2.—The Foreign Office has issued a blue book which contains the correspondence concerning an agreement between Great Britain and Russia as to the protection of the sealing interests in the North Pacific Ocean or Behring Sea.

The original contention of Russia was that her citizens should have exclusive control over the sealing interests in the Behring Sea.

Lord Rosebery declined to agree to such vessels being sent to the Behring Sea, where the cases should be dealt with by a British court.
