When the results of this questionnaire come in it will be possible for officials of the association to speak definitely for the whole body of physicians. In the phases of the matter, including the proposed restrictions on the freedom of physicians in prescribing alcohol, the committee has received a memorandum submitted by the Dominion Alliance.
