

PRICE OF PEARS AND PLUMS FIRM

Good Supply of Potatoes At Dollar Bushel.

To-day's market was well supplied for Thursday and business was brisk. Fruit arrived in quantity during the morning, but there was little price change, the general tendency being easier, with the exception of plums, which stiffened materially.

There was a good supply of potatoes, which, in a few local cases, sold down to 21 a bushel, but these were not of good quality. For the best the price has not changed since Tuesday.

Spring chickens are slightly higher, selling for 22 to 25 cents a pound live weight. Hay and oats are unchanged, though in good demand.
