THE ARMY WORM

On accout of the crops in some districts being badly attacked by this pest, it is advisable for every farmer to be on the lookout and ready to combat it if it comes his way

The army worm is about one and one-half inches long when full grown and is striped with black, yellow and green, of a dingy appearance and much resembling the cutworm. When detected, all efforts should be centred on keeping the worms out of crops not yet attacked. A deep furrow, (several furrows are better) ploughed around the fields with the vertical or steep side of the furrow next to the crop to be protected, serves as a barrier to prevent the march of the worms, as they will not be able to crawl up the straight 12 from Waterloo, 16 from Norfolk, 26 side of the furrow. Holes or pits should be dug in the bottom of the changes in their list of subscribers, either furrow every ten or twelve feet to catch the worms as they crawl along looking for a place to get out. They can then be destroyed with a blunt stick or by burning straw over them.

By thoroughly spraying or dusting a small strip of the crop in advance of the worms with Paris green, and liberally distributing poisoned bran (mixed at the rate of fifty pounds bran and one pound Paris green with enough molasses and water to sweeten it) large numbers may be destroyed. A field so poisoned must not be pastured until rain has thoroughly washed it. Whatever is done must be done quickly and at once, for a single day's delay may often mean the ruin of a valuable crop. F. C. N., Commission of Conservation.

Army Worm Still Spreading

The army worm pest is spreading

The army worm pest is spreading with alarming rapidity throughout Waterloo County and to-day large numbers of farmers have been engaged following the instructions sent out by Ontario Department of Agriculture to exterminate the destructive caterpillar.

On Sunday George Hahn, living on the Bresleau road, one and a half miles from the city, discovered a large field of oats practically destroyed by the worms before he even realized that his farm had been invaded. Trenches were dug and everything possible was done to prevent the worms from getting to near-by farms, but the efforts were futile, and nearly every farm on both sides on Bresleau road is invaded by the pests. Samuel Brubacher found fields that were covered with marching worms, and has a body of men assisting him to extinguish the worms.
