O'Connell and the Autocrat of Russia.—An application was lately made by a lady of high rank to Mr. O'Connell to obtain from him an autograph, in order to make apart of a collection of the hand-writing of several "celebrated persons," intended for the Emperor of Russia. We have got a copy of the reply dictated by Mr. O'Connell, and sent to the lady at his desire, in the gentleman who acts as his secretary. How this refusal prostrates an Emperor, and places a subject immeasurably above him! The following is the copy:—"Merrion square, Dublin, 16th June, 1841.—Madame,—I am directed by Mr. O'Connell to acknowledge the honour of your Ladyship's letter of the 12th instant, and to express his deep regret that he is unable to comply with the request of so distinguished a lady. The fact (to use his own words) is, that the tedious cruelties of the present Emperor of Russia, perpetrated in Poland even upon women and children, have marked his character with a deeper shade of infamy than that which stains the reputation of the Roman Nero; whilst his Satanic persecution of Catholic Christianity has reduced him beneath the level of the ancient Dioclesian. Mr. O'Connell, therefore, cannot consent by any act of his, however slight, to appear to pay a compliment to so atrocious a monster. He respectfully trusts that you will not consider this refusal as a personal disrespect to your Ladyship, which it certainly is not intended to be. It is merely meant as the expression of his execration of a tyrant who has deserved the hatred and contempt of the present generation, and whose name will be held in horror by a more impartial posterity. I have the honour to be, Madam, your Ladyship's most obedient servant—W. J. O'NEIL DAUNT."

The U. S. Bank Bill.—In our last we stated on the authority of a U. S. paper that the President had sanctioned this bill, since then, however, we have received President Tyler's Message vetoing the Bill. Want of space obliges us to defer extracting the material parts of the Message.

Canadian Colonist Debts.—Upper Canada owes 1,190,000 pounds current; Lower Canada only 114,000 pounds; less than one tenth of that due by the upper provinces.

Lord Sydenham has refused his countenance and support to the *Quebec Review* which are to take place in September. This excellent example is well worthy of imitation, and should be followed by other public functionaries in the Province.

WEST INDIA MARKET.—We have been favoured with the following extract of a letter from Demerara, dated 5th August, to a Mercantile House in this town:—"White Pine Lumber is getting very scarce, and a good price might now be obtained for two or three cargoes—Shingles are not to be had. The former might fetch \$37 per M. and the latter \$6. Wet Provisions are very abundant, Prime Pork is only \$14, Rice, Flour, and Corn Meal are in great plenty, and Bread Stuffs of every kind are quite neglected on account of the immense quantity in the market. Business generally is very much depressed, but we look forward to an improvement as the year rolls on. The great bulk of our crop is yet to make. Immigrants are arriving in large numbers from Madeira, Sierra Leone, and the Islands."

OUR MARKET SQUARE is now finished, and admitted by all to be a great improvement to the appearance of the Town. We trust that their Worship will not allow a building either public or private to be erected on it, as there is not a public square in the Town but one. Now let the Old Court House be repaired, and we shall then have a good Market House and Public Room, which are much needed.

DENNING—Much as we dislike the system of *denning*, yet we are obliged again to call upon subscribers for their subscriptions. The amount is small and when paid regularly will not be felt. There are a number of delinquents which have been called upon repeatedly, and have not paid us, these, we regret to say, after the 1st of September, will have to pay their respective accounts to a *Magistrate* as we have bills to pay which must be met in a few weeks. Let those who are indebted to us take this to themselves. Our best thanks are due to those persons who have already paid us.

SEA SERPENT—A schooner sailing from the Macadavie to this Harbour, on Monday last, was followed by an immense Serpent nearly to the entrance of the harbor. The Captain and men informed us that two were seen together a few days previous in the Bay. As they were not good at guessing they could not tell the exact length of the reptile. Some say that it must have been the great American Sea Serpent, but we do not believe it was, as that monster would nearly reach from here to Macadavie, if the accounts we have seen are correct.

POSTPONEMENT.—It will be observed by a Notice in another column that the meeting of the C. C. Emigrant Society is postponed until the 21st September. We understand that the meeting has been postponed for the purpose of affording time to obtain more subscribers in the out parishes, and in the expectation that that day will be more convenient for members from the country to attend, as it is the one on which the Court of Quarter Sessions opens.

FLOUR.—This very useful article has risen in price within the last ten days. It is now selling from \$7 50 to \$8 00 per barrel. The price of bread, in consequence, is also raised.

On Sunday last we had quite a refreshing rain which served in some measure to cool the parched earth. On Monday morning, however, the sun shone out as hot as ever and has continued to do so during each successive day this week. The potatoe crop, it is said, will not be so abundant as anticipated in consequence of the long drought.
