Indeed it is scarcely possible for any person to examine the two modes of translation without perceiving the manifest superiority of the former.—*Watchman.*

We quite agree with the writer of the preface that "these parallelisms" give the reader a more accurate impression of the spirit and beauty of this Divine poetry, and often assist materially in the correct understanding of its meaning; as it may thus be read with greater clearness, and with a more perfect connection as to the sense.—*Church*

Were a Synod of biblical critics to decide in what way such a Psalter should be got up, we presume the arrangement of the editor now presented to the public would be substantially that decided upon as the best for bringing out not only the beauties but the meaning of these sublime spiritual songs.—*Montreal Witness*

A settled conviction that the Bible-reading community generally would be considerably benefitted by perusing the Scriptures in the form here published, has induced us again to revert to the subject. Much obscurity and misconception has arisen from the cursory perusal of the sacred volume, as it is presented in the common version. Dr. Kitto says, 'Stephens' wild and undigested system of breaking up the text into what appears to the eye of the learned, and to the mind of the unlearned, as so many detached sentences, has had a deleterious effect on the sense of scripture, and perhaps given rise to some heresies.' Horne, in his 'Introduction,' says, 'Nothing, perhaps has contributed more to render the poem of Job obscure than the division into chapters and verses, by which not only the unity of the general subject, but frequently that of a single paragraph, is broken.' * * * No portion of the Scriptures, however, suffers so much as the poetical portion, which is shorn of its beautiful imagery and its native sublimity by the guise which it wears. * * * Not the least interesting part of this little volume is the Appendix, which contains the Sermon on the Mount, arranged in parallelisms, extracted from Bishop Jebb's 'Sacred Literature.' The learned Bishop says, when he perused it in this form, 'he found more elucidative of our Lord's method and meaning, than all the observations of all the commentators he had ever consulted.'—*Globe.*

The introductory treatise, which seems collated with great care, refers to the construction of the Psalms; the nature of the Hebrew poetry; the moral and spiritual influence of the Psalms; the obscurity caused by arbitrary divisions; chronological arrangement; explanation of the titles; classification; and the poetical parallelism—a very striking peculiarity in Hebrew poetry;—and presenting itself in a variety of forms, as the responsive and gradual, the antithetic and the synthetic, &c. Special reference is made to the lyric poetry of the Hebrews, as being different from the lyric verse of all other nations.—*Canadian Presbyterian Magazine.*

The book may undoubtedly be rendered highly serviceable in studying that very important and interesting portion of the sacred volume.—*Christian Guardian.*
