LATEST MARKETS.

TORONTO, Sept. 1.—A New York Special describes the wheat market—Better Liverpool cables were a support to the market and saved it from a weakness that other features indicated and would probably have given it. French cables were not encouraging. In the absence of any export business the improved English cables were suspiciously regarded. Re-selling of wheat recently purchased for export was continued to-day. Strength in western markets is largely based on the belief that farmers are not going to sell freely on the lowered prices. Monthly export estimates range from 15,000 to 20,000,000 bushels. The attitude of the cash market here is again apprehensive.

Wheat—The offerings are fair, the demand from the millers and for export is good and the market is steady, with sales of now wheat to day at 50c and 51c north and west. Manitoba flour is about steady, but buyers contend that it is held above its legitimate value, and this is about the fact of the case, as those who hold any stock of the latter in the city make concessions, and owing to the small supply can afford to wait for sales, and those who have none are indisposed to bring any down for fear it would result in a break in the market.

FARMERS' MARKET. About 1,000 bushels of new red wheat sold at 80c to 86c; old white sold at from 85c to 90c; and spotted wheat brought 70c.
